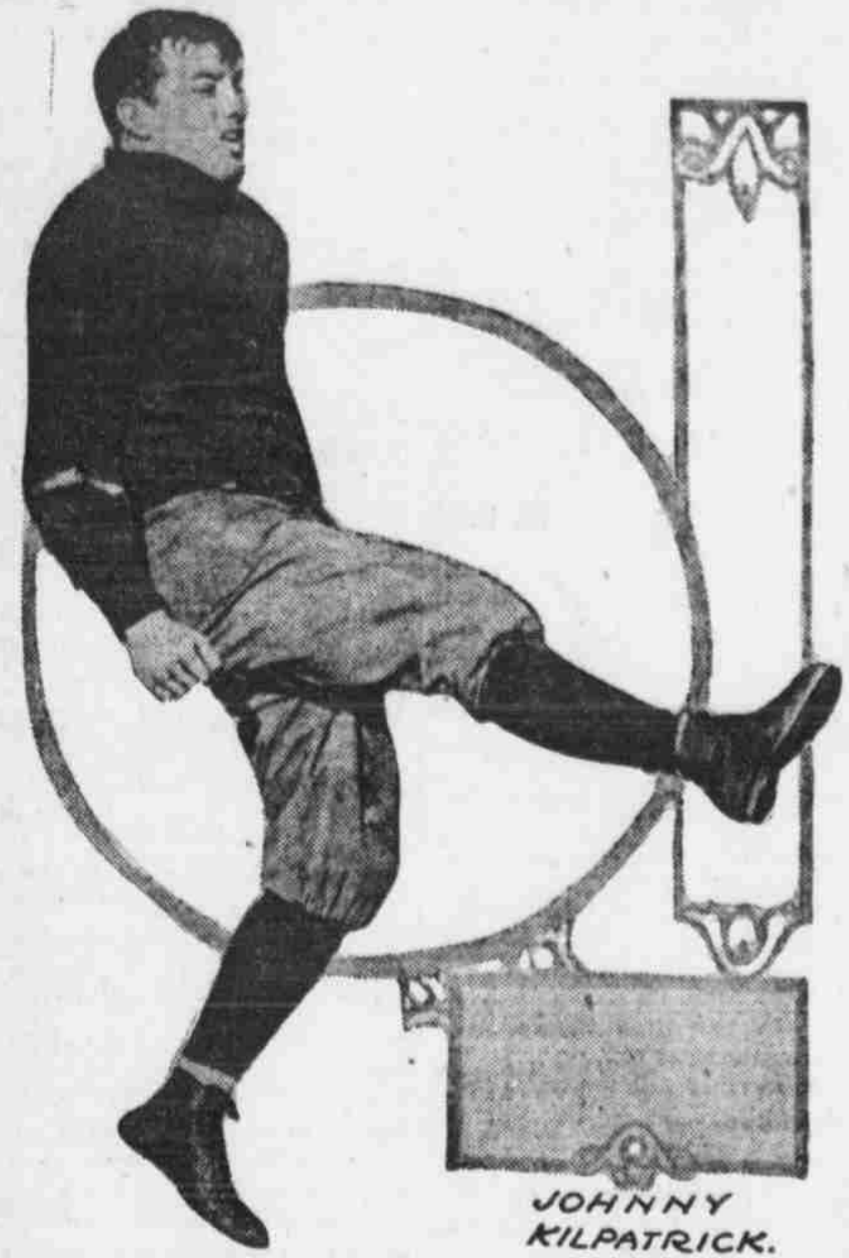


Kilpatrick to Succeed Hinkey at Yale?

Speculation is rife at New Haven as to the man who will succeed Frank Hinkey as head coach of the Yale football team. That Hinkey will not be retained for next year is a foregone conclusion. At present Johnny Kilpatrick, one of the greatest ends ever turned out at Yale, is being boomed for the job. Kilpatrick has large business interests and it is a question whether

Yale can offer him sufficient inducements to cause him to give up so much of his time, as will be required by a head coach. Every year since his graduation Kilpatrick has assisted in the coaching at New Haven. He knows modern football as well as any coach in the business, has plenty of aggressiveness and has shown himself possessed of good teaching ability.

SEES RENEWED HARMONY AMONG ALL SCHOLARS

(Correspondence of The Associated Press) BERLIN, Oct. 15.—That the existing estrangement between the learned men of Germany and those of the countries

with which it is at war will not prove permanent is the belief of Prof. von Willamowitz-Moellendorf, the new rector of the Berlin university. In his inaugural address delivered today, while expressing in a resigned way the conviction that he and others of his

age would die without seeing harmony restored between the scholars of the belligerent countries, he asserted his faith that the younger men of this generation will live to see it. He argued that the learned men of any one nation are too dependent upon those of other nations

to be able to shut themselves off for long from intellectual give-and-take with men who are at present their enemies. Most forms of scientific work, he said, cannot be renewed without the use of foreign materials and foreign investigations; and this very fact will com-

pel learned men to come together. Willamowitz-Moellendorf is also strongly opposed to Germans trying to establish a taboo against foreign languages and books whatever foreign peoples do in that direction against Germany.

Nebraska Coach Tries to Tell Mass Meeting Hawkeyes Are Dangerous, but Grin Gives Him Away.

PLANS FOR BIG HOMECOMING

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 19.—(Special.)—The last "pep" rally of the season jammed Memorial hall yesterday with 1,000 yelling students to kick up a little enthusiasm for the Iowa game.

Guy Reed, Prof. C. A. Robbins, Secretary Walter Whitten of the Lincoln Commercial club, Prof. Barbour, who has not missed a football game at Nebraska in twenty-two years, Dr. Condra and Coach Jumbo Stiehm all spoke briefly, but the members of the team feigned bashfulness and refused to be drawn even to the platform.

Coach Stiehm had his "beat" factory working on the eve of the Iowa game. "There's no telling what will happen," the Nebraska mentor ventured. "Iowa is coming to beat us. She has pointed all season for this game."

Then, unfortunately, Stiehm indulged in one of his rare grins. Three Special Trains. Guy Reed told of the arrangements for the "home-coming" and said that three special trains would bring hundreds of alumni to Lincoln. A large number of additional social features have been added to the "home-coming program" by the fraternities and sororities, nearly every one of which will hold some kind of party.

Nearly as large an advance sale as for the Notre Dame game is reported by Manager Reed, who expects every seat will be filled. It will be Captain Rutherford's last game in a Cornhusker uniform and special preparations are being made to do him honor.

The squad is keeping out of the limelight pretty well this week, all practice being behind closed doors. Stiehm let it be known that his team was in fine shape and should be well prepared to entertain the Hawkeyes with a new assortment of formations Saturday afternoon.
