CORNELL DEFEATS QUAKER WARRIORS

Unbeaten Reds Come Back Strong and Win After Having Been Given Bad Score.

TWENTY-FOUR TO NOTHING

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.—Cornell defeated Pennsylvania here today 24 to 0, but not until the claimants for the eastern football championship had been given a bad score. It was a desperate struggle all the way. When the final period opened, the fighting Quakers had beaten the unbeaten Red team down by a score of 9 to 7. Then the Ithacans rose to the night, battered the Pennsylvania line to pieces and scored two touchdowns, with goals, and a field goal by Captain Barrett.

Details of the Play. All the playing in the first period was in Pennsylvania's territory. Pennsylvania showed fine defensive work and Cornell was compelled to kick often. Once Cornell carried the ball from midfield by line-backing by Shiverick, Collins and Barrett and a fifteen-yard forward pass, Barrett to Eckley, to Pennsylvania's six-yard line, where Cornell was held for down. Pennsylvania punted to its own forty-yard line. Then Cornell made another fifteen-yard gain on a forward pass, Barrett to Tilley, and added ten more in line plunges.

The ball was on Pennsylvania's fifteen-yard line when the second period opened. Two tries at the Quaker line failed and then Captain Barrett swiftly swung around Pennsylvania's right end and, eluding all tacklers, scored a touchdown. He also kicked goal.

Later Pennsylvania got the ball on Cornell's forty-four-yard line on Shiverick's fumble. Pennsylvania was penalized fifteen yards. Then the Quakers made two wonderful forward passes. The first, Miller to Hopkins, carried the ball forty yards to Cornell's nineteen-yard line and the second, Williams to Bell, put the pigskin on Cornell's one-yard line. Williams then took the ball through the Ithaca team for a touchdown. The kick for goal was a failure.

Just before the period ended Barrett fumbled a punt. Pennsylvania recovered. Hawley, substituting for Hopkins, failed at a field goal from Cornell's forty-yard line.

Cornell getting the ball Barrett tried to forward pass, but it was intercepted by Rockefeller of Pennsylvania. Then Hawley tried another field goal from the Cornell twenty-eight-yard line and made it.

Score and second period: Pennsylvania 9, Cornell 7.

Pennsylvania is Penalized. Early in the third period Pennsylvania was penalized a total of thirty yards for holding. Barrett tried a field goal from Pennsylvania's thirty-two-yard line and failed. Cornell then worked the ball down the field again to Pennsylvania's thirty-yard line, where the Quaker line held and Barrett made a second unsuccessful try at field goal. Score, end third period: Pennsylvania, 9, Cornell, 17.

The final period opened with the ball in Cornell's possession on its own forty-seven-yard line. By terrific line smashing it managed to batter the ball to Pennsylvania's fifty-two-yard line. Here Captain Barrett broke through Pennsylvania's first defense, dodged the second line of protection and ran forty-two yards for his second touchdown.

He also kicked the goal. Cornell after this again worked the ball into Pennsylvania's territory and again Barrett failed at a field goal. Then Captain Barrett intercepted a Pennsylvania forward pass on the Quakers' thirty-yard-line, and fine line bucking took the ball over for another touchdown, Shiverick carrying the ball. Barrett kicked goal. In the subsequent playing Shiverick made a first goal and then Barrett kicked his first goal.

Final score: Cornell 24, Pennsylvania 9.

OMAHA HIGH BEATS GRAND ISLAND 14-6

Local Team Comes Back After Being Three Times Defeated This Year.

GAME IS HARD-FOUGHT BATTLE

Omaha High school "came back" yesterday after having been beaten this season by three strong teams and defeated Grand Island by a score of 14 to 6.

The game was a battle from start to finish. Grand Island put across its only touchdown at the beginning of the second quarter, but failed to kick goal.

Morarty took the ball over for the first touchdown after grabbing a long pass from Weirich, covering the remainder of the thirty yards and placing the ball squarely behind the goal posts before a Grand Island player could get near him. Fullaway kicked goal.

The second touchdown was put across by "Chick" Neville just after Grand Island had been penalized fifteen yards for holding in the middle of the last quarter. With the ball in Omaha's possession on the ten-yard line, plunged through for the remaining distance. Fullaway again kicked goal.

In the first quarter Grand Island proceeded to march right down the field, but Omaha held near its goal line and an attempted dropkick by Buechler failed. Omaha then punted and for the rest of the quarter Omaha was on the defense with the ball see-sawing backward and forward. On a criss-cross play Krebs took the ball to the ten-yard line. Omaha held and Buechler again attempted a dropkick, but failed. The quarter ended with Fullaway punting from behind the goal line after Omaha had failed to gain.

Grand Island First to Score. Grand Island started the second quarter with their pet criss-cross play, making ten yards, and being stopped on Omaha's seven-yard line. Grand Island then put over their only touchdown, a ten-yard pass from Kaufman to Jones doing the work. They failed on the kickout. Then began a punting duel between Fullaway and Buechler. Grand Island used their criss-cross play to good advantage in this quarter, making large gains every time it was attempted. Kaufman proved the best ground gainer for the visitors, ripping off twenty and twenty-five yards at a clip. The half ended with the ball in the center of the field in Omaha's possession.

At the beginning of the second half Fullaway kicked off to Kaufman, who returned twenty yards. Grand Island could not gain and punted to Neville, who fumbled but recovered instantly. He was tackled in his tracks. Omaha continued to play on the defensive and Fullaway punted. The Grand Island line began to weaken and Grove broke through, blocking an attempted punt. Beard began to

make life miserable for the Grand Island backfield, continually breaking through and missing up their plays. Grand Island was penalized twice in succession for holding and was forced to punt. Krebs continued to star for the visitors, making good gains on the criss-cross, the third quarter ending directly after he had taken the ball from the center of the field to Omaha's seventeen-yard line.

It was the visitors' ball on the seventeen-yard line, but they failed to gain and Fullaway punted sixty yards down the field and rolled to the goal line when Kaufman fumbled.

Omaha Gains Advantage.

From this point until the rest of the game Grand Island seemed to slow up. It was Omaha's ball on Grand Island's thirty-yard line when the visitors failed to gain. Then came Omaha's first touchdown. A brilliantly executed forward pass play in which Morarty received the ball and while going at full speed, from Weirich tied the score. Fullaway kicked goal and Omaha was one point to the good. Nothing could stop the "Purple and White" from then on. Grand Island received the kick-off and returned to the center of the field, but lost the ball on a fumble. Omaha then walked right through the Grand Island huskies, rushing the ball to the ten-yard line from where Neville went through center for the second touchdown. Fullaway added the final point by kicking goal.

It was their last game for Neville, Beard, Nichols, Weirich, Fullaway, Grove and Crowley, all of these men being Seniors. Beard refused to leave the game when Coach Mulligan sent in a substitute for him in the last few moments and finished the game at center. Fullaway saved Omaha on numerous occasions by his strong punting, one of his punts going sixty yards, and the rest averaging over forty-five yards.
