FARM CONGRESS HERE THIS WEEK

Splendid Program of Addresses by Prominent Men to Feature the Convocation.

FOR FAVORABLE LEGISLATION

Seven hundred prominent farmers of the state will be in Omaha for three days this week, beginning Tuesday, for the sixth annual convention of the Nebraska Farmers' Congress.

From a small beginning a few years ago, the organization has become large and influential. At its coming gathering, a big program of important addresses and discussions will be considered.

To secure favorable legislation for the farmers, is the avowed purpose of the congress. Largely through its efforts, the state registration and public warehouse bills were passed by the last legislature, and the congress has made itself felt in other ways.

Delegates to the convention here were named last week by seventy-five organizations of farm organizations in all parts of Nebraska.

Headquarters will be at Hotel Rome, where registration of delegates will begin Tuesday morning at 8:30 o'clock. George Coupland of Elgin, president of the congress, will call the first session at 9:30. Rev. Titus Lowe will pronounce the invocation. The remainder of the morning will be given over to addresses of welcome by Mayor Dahman and Chairman C. C. Rostwater of the Omaha Bureau of Publicity, a response by President Coupland, reports of officers and appointment of committees.

One of the big features of the convention will be an address, "The Marketing of Farm Products," by C. J. Brand, chief of the office of farm marketing of the Department of Agriculture at Washington. The subsequent discussion will be led by J. W. Shorthill, secretary of the Nebraska Farmers' Cooperative Live Stock and Grain Shipping association.

Washington Official Here.

Another special address by an official of the Department of Agriculture, one that will attract wide attention among the farmers, will be delivered Thursday morning by Prof. H. F. Williams. He is in charge of farm management surveys in this state, for the department at Washington. The subject of that subject, using data gathered in investigations of over 1,000 Nebraska farms.

Prof. C. W. Fugatey, director of the University of Nebraska's agricultural extension department, will lead the discussion following Prof. Williams' address. The actual cost of operating farms and raising crops will be thoroughly talked over, and some surprising figures are promised on the profits of farming.

Many Prominent Speakers.

Among other prominent speakers and their subjects, the following are announced: "The Relation of the University to the Agricultural Interests,"—Chancellor Samuel Avery of the University of Nebraska, and Dean E. A. Burnett of the College of Agriculture; "Rural Credits,"—P. G. Ostell of Omaha, secretary of the American Rural Credit association, and C. E. Burnham of Norfolk, director of the Federal Reserve bank; "Rural Schools,"—A. O. Thomas, state superintendent of schools, President Coupland and A. V. Teed of Lincoln; "Community Interests,"—R. M. Tyson of Tobias, secretary of the Society of Equity; C. H. Gustafson of Mead, president of the Farmers' union; Ross L. Hammond of Fremont and W. F. Baxter of Omaha.

Entertainment for Delegates.

Entertainment of the delegates will be the program on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. Nebraska and Omaha will be shown in "movies," and Miss Anna McCormick of Papillion will give a reading. Tuesday night at the convention hall, Wednesday evening's entertainment will consist of a big reception at the Commercial club rooms.

During the various sessions, attractive musical programs will be furnished by the Omaha School of Music, under the direction of J. E. Carnal.

The changes in specifications involve only the sub-basement, heating plant and foundation work, intended to cut down the original bids, so that the fourteen-story building may be erected within the \$700,000 limit set by the owners.
