"Northwest Nebraska is a most wonder ful country and I never realized the extent of its resources until I made a trip up there last week," asserted J. H. Dumont, who is back from three days spent in an automobile going over Sheridan, Box Butte, Dawes and Sloux counties.

"At Hay Springs," continued Mr. Dumont, "I met Herman Peters, who for years was proprietor of the Merchants hotel in Omaha. Up where he now lives he is president of the Hay Springs Commercial club, besides owning a large ranch along the Niobrara river, twenty miles from town. His ranch is all fenced with post and wire, hog tight and extends over hills and valleys. He has 2,000 acres under cultivation and is feeding 1,700

"Out through the northeastern part of Box Butte county the land lies high and level, with a soil of heavy black loam, adapted to raising alfalfa and all kinds of grain. Potatoes do exceptionally well. "In Dawes county along the White river the country is rough, the hills almost like mountains and covered with pine timber.

"At Harrison, the county seat of Sloux county, I met ThomasF. Boyd, for many years a resident of Omaha. He has been in Sloux county cleven years, is county treasurer.

"Northeast of Harrison there is a large table land on which a great deal of alfalfa is raised. Considerable of the land is under irrigation.

"I believe the development of northwest Nebraska has hardly begun. In my judgment it will not be long until the greater part of the area will be productive. The bulk of the land is good for agricultural purposes and that that caunot be cultivated is useful for grazing and growing hay."
