DRAINAGE LAW IS GOOD SAYS HUGHES

United States Supreme Court Upholds Act Permitting State to Take Lands.

IN LINE WITH CONSTITUTION

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(Special Telegram.)—Justice Hughes in the decision of the supreme court, affirming the opinion of the opinion of the supreme court of Nebraska in the case of Henry W. O'Neill and Cornelius K. Herferan, plaintiffs in error, against Jacob F. Leamer and others, supervisors of drainage district No. 2 in Dakota county, said that the provisions of the fourteenth amendment, "embodying fundamental conceptions of justice cannot be deemed to prevent a state from adopting a public policy for the irrigation of arid lands or for the reclamation of wet or overflowed lands."
