

### LOW DEATH RATE AT CHILD SAVING

Lowest Infant Mortality Rate of any Similar Institution in the United States.

#### OTHERS SEEKING INFORMATION

The lowest infant mortality rate of any institution in the United States is that of the Child Saving Institute in Omaha.

Of 166 babies handled and cared for this year but one was lost. The babies remain in the institution an average of three and one-half months until adopted.

So remarkably low has been the infant mortality rate that eastern institutions in considerable number have written her letters of inquiry as to just how the babies are cared for and other details of the institution's work.

This demand has led those in charge to establish a system of taking a careful record of history of every case that comes in, in order that accurate, reliable statistical information may be furnished to other institutions and become a matter of historical record for future guidance in the care of infants.

The Child Saving Institute has just been favored with another endowment of \$2,000 from a wealthy individual of Omaha, whose name is not being made public in this connection.

At a meeting at noon at the Commercial club all of the old officers of the institution were re-elected, and three new members were elected to the board of directors. The new directors are: Rev. G. A. Hurlbert, Rev. George L. Peters and Miss Myrtle Warren.

The officers re-elected are W. A. De Bord, president; George L. Alley, vice president; Barton Millard, treasurer, and Mrs. A. A. McCraw, secretary.

### Baby Health Week to Be at Lincoln Christmas Week

The baby health week conference arranged for Omaha for yesterday has been postponed until the week between Christmas and New Years and will be held in Lincoln. The change was necessitated because of the illness of Mrs. Hugh Lee, secretary of the state federation of the civic committee of the Nebraska Federation of Women's clubs. Baby Health week is to be observed by club women all over the country the week of March 1.

Mrs. A. E. Davison of the home economics department of the University of Nebraska, and chairman of the same department for the state federation, and Mrs. K. R. E. Edholm, health chairman and the federal representative of the children's bureau in Nebraska, held a brief conference here yesterday. Mrs. Davison being in attendance at the Farmers' congress.

It was tentatively decided that a three-number program would be arranged, each department, the health, civic and home economics, to contribute one section. This committee will arrange the programs to be given all over the state.

### Two More British Steamships Sunk

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Two more British steamers, the Colenso and the Orange Prince have been sunk, presumably by German submarines.

The Colenso, of 2,832 tons, sailed from Middlesbrough October 28 for Hull, where it arrived October 31 for Bombay.

The latest maritime records show that the Orange Prince, of 2,296 tons, was at Liverpool October 7.

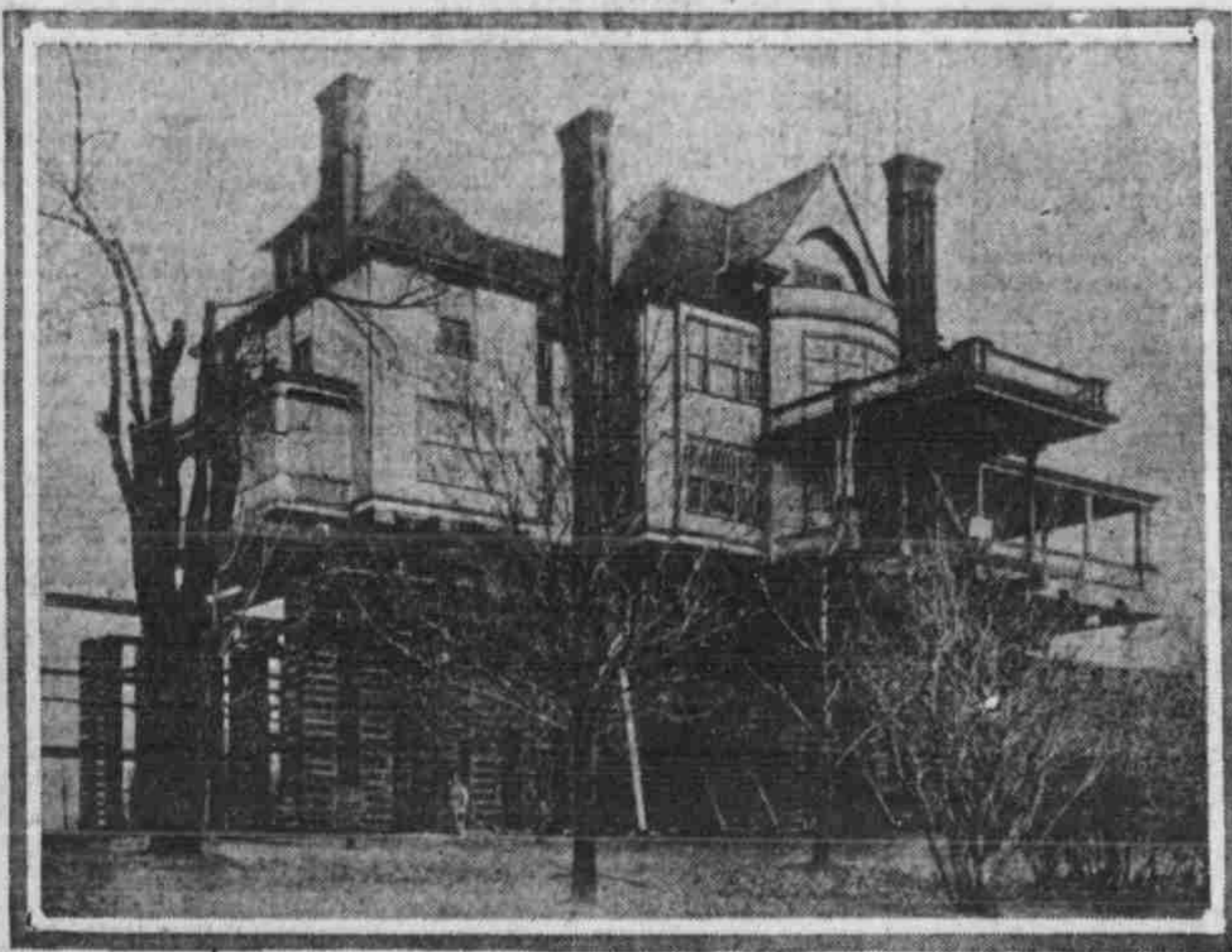
### TRUSTY SWEEPS OFFICE AND THEN MAKES ESCAPE

## Schwab Spares Trees in Moving House by Lifting the House Over Tree-Tops



MOVING SCHWAB HOME AT LORETTO, PA.

There is real sentiment in trees to Charles M. Schwab, especially those trees which have sheltered his fine old homestead, called "Immergrun," near Loretto, Pa.

Recently Mr. Schwab decided to build a new \$1,000,000 summer residence on the site of the old home, but he did not want to destroy the beautiful frame house which has been home to him and his wife's mansion on Riverside drive, New York. The house is entirely surrounded by trees and to move it and

not destroy the trees was no unsurmountable obstacle to the man who has made Bethlehem steel jump from less than \$5 to 100.

When Mr. Schwab first spoke to his engineers about moving the Loretto homestead, they mapped out for him a plan which sacrificed only three trees. "I would not think of cutting down those trees," said Mr. Schwab. "All you have to do is to jack the house over the trees. It is only thirty feet."

So the engineers got busy and are moving the fine old Schwab residence over the trees. By the route being taken, the house goes over twenty-three trees before it will reach the road. The maximum height the house will be jacked over in thirty-four feet. It then starts on its journey across deep valley on the Schwab farm, where it will find a new resting place. It will travel 1,000 feet from its present location and will cross a little hill.

### CHARGES AGAINST ILLINOIS OFFICIALS

Treasurer and Auditor Are Accused of Making Improper Payments by Chicago Taxpayer.

#### ALLEGES MANY IRREGULARITIES

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 2.—Charges that Andrew Russell, Illinois state treasurer, and James J. Brady, state auditor, "knowingly and willfully" permitted irregular payments amounting to thousands of dollars to be made from state legislative committee expense funds, are contained in an amended bill of complaint filed in the circuit court here today by J. B. Fergus, a Chicago taxpayer.

A previous injunction suit filed by Fergus held up appropriations made by the last legislature and resulted in the calling of a special session. The bill asks that the officials be held liable for the refunding of the money to the state.

The bill further charges that Lieutenant Governor Barratt O'Hara, having failed in attempt to obtain an appropriation of \$10,000 for his white slavery investigation committee, planned a "trick and device" whereby the treasury was to be depleted of the sum of \$10,000. It is charged that nine vouchers for pretended services aggregating exactly \$10,000 were signed by the lieutenant governor and that with one exception were delivered to one person, who obtained the money.

### Mrs. Fried, Nebraska Pioneer, Is Dead After Long Illness

Mrs. Mary A. Fried, widow of the late Carl A. Fried, pioneer wholesaler merchant, died after an illness of several months at her home, 202 North Nineteenth street, yesterday.

Mrs. Fried was born in Hagerstad, Sweden, June 7, 1842. She came, with her parents, to America in 1849, and settled at Andover, Ill. She was married to the late Carl A. Fried April 1, 1866. In the fall of 1868, Mr. and Mrs. Fried came to Nebraska and settled on a homestead four miles west of Oakland, Burt county. In 1870 Mr. Fried moved to Fremont and became associated with H. Y. Lee in the mercantile business. In 1870 Lee & Fried established the wholesale hardware store of Lee, Fried & Co., in Omaha.

Mrs. Fried is survived by three sons and four daughters. They are: Ernest L. Fried, Beemer; C. A. Fried, Theron G. Fried, Mrs. W. F. Chambers and Miss Evelyn Fried, Omaha; Mrs. V. A. Lagen, Dubuque, Ia., and Mrs. William P. Mullin, Berkeley, Cal., also by her sister, Mrs. William Fried, Fremont, and her brother, C. O. Lobeck of Omaha. Her sons and daughters, her sister and brother were all present when the end came. She was a lifelong member of the Methodist church, having her membership with the Swedish Methodist Episcopal church since coming to Omaha. The funeral will be from the residence Friday, December 3, at 2 o'clock p. m., with burial at Prospect Hill cemetery. Congressman C. O. 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### Italy Agrees With the Entente Not to Make Separate Peace

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Italy gave its adherence on Monday to the London agreement of the other entente allies not to conclude a separate peace, says a Milan dispatch to the Matin.

Lieutenant General Count Cadorna, chief of the Italian general staff, who was to have visited France for a conference with the French or British commanders and for an inspection of the western battle front, has been compelled to forego his trip, the Matin's correspondent says, because of the intensity of the fighting on the Italian front, especially along the Isonzo. General Porro, under chief of the general staff, will be sent as a substitute and will arrive in Paris December 5.
