American Steamer Hocking Requisitioned Without Any Legal Formalities at All.

NO PRIZE COURT PROCEDURE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 .- Official steamship Hocking had been requisitioned by the British government without the formality of prize court proceedings was received by and is a menace to health, it is dethe State department late today in clared. a dispatch from Consul General Young at Halifax, where the ship has been detained since it was selzed by a British warship while on the way from New York to Norfolk.

This procedure will be vigorously contested by the United States government as being illegal and in violation of recognized right under international law.

Rely on Order-In-Council. Attorneys acting for Great Britain in the cases base their motions for orders of requisition upon a British order-in-council, issued April 29, which the United States is not prepared to accept as in accordance with international law.

The State department now is awaiting a report from Ambassador Page at London who, after the department has received unofficial intimation of the in tention of the British government, wa instructed to inquire into the matte and to enter a vigorous protest if h found that requisition was contemplated Although no information has been re ceived from Ambassador Page tonight, was presumed by department official that he has received confirmation in Lon don. The department desires to know juwhat action Mr. Page has taken befor determining what form further represen tations shall take.

Agreement of Crown.
Consul General Young's dispatch said that when the order allowing requisition was granted by the prize court in Halifax this afternoon it was stipulated that the crown should give an undertaking for the appraised value of the ship. The crown under this argument agrees to pay the amount of the appraisement into the court should final adjudication in the case be against the British government. The report contained no details regarding appraisement. Dispatches received by Counselor Polk of the State department from attorneys for the American Trans-Atlantic company, however, stated that in the case of the Genesce the undertaking had been fixed at £45,000.

Officials of the State department already are arranging the legal arguments which may be used in the case. They have found that during the civil war certain neutral ships were seized and equisitioned by the United States before prize court adjudication. Most of these ships, however, are said to have been

Collects Affidavits.

The department also was informed tonight that the American Trans-Atlantic company had nearly completed its col-jection of affidavits from the holders of stock in the corporation, which will, it is claimed, prove that the company is wholly owned by American citizens. All but two of the affidavits, it was said, had been collected. Those now on hand, it was said, might be immediately submitted to the State department for its nformation. It is claimed they show that at least 90 per cent of the stock is wned by American citizens.

The Hocking was requisitioned under authority of a rule of prize court pro-cedure, provided for by the order-in-counil reading as follows:




