Tod Sloan Refuses to Discuss His Case

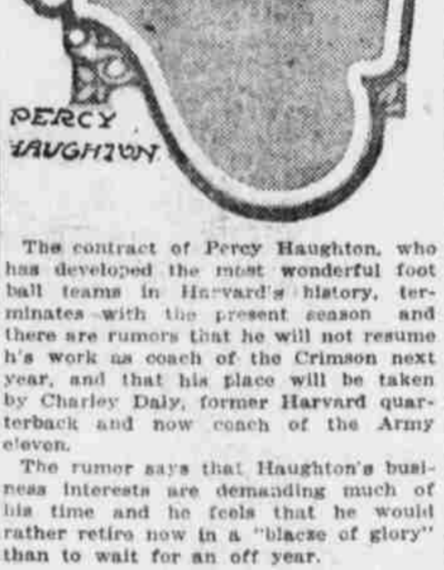
