The story was printed in The Bee on Wednesday and today Mrs. Doane reported that an Omaha man has offered to furnish the needed teeth as a Christmas present. The boy will receive his drum, too.

That little incident of the teeth and the drum is just typical of many cases being brought to the attention of the secretary of the charities and illustrates the scope of the Christmas work being done by The Bee, Mrs. Doane and others, to make every one happy at the Yuletide season.

"Do you know, Mrs. Doane, I would have a merry Christmas if you would have a ton of coal sent to us for Christmas. My husband is ill and I am doing some work, but it just seems that every cent goes for necessities," said a woman who called at the charities office.
