

### OD THINGS FOR CHRISTMAS FEED

Markets Filled with Plenty to Select From, with the Prices Slightly Higher.

#### TURKEYS ABOUT THE SAME

Just as mother learns that turkeys and other Christmas fowls will sell this season at about the same prices as they did last year, along comes Mr. Market Man with the doleful news that several other important Yuletide eatables have taken a decidedly upward turn in prices.

Cranberry sauce for instance, will be very expensive, comparatively speaking. For cranberries, used in making that most essential adjunct of the turkey dinner, have suddenly jumped up \$1 per barrel, and on the Christmas market will cost from 10 to 12 1/2 cents a quart, instead of only 7 1/2 to 8 1/2 cents, as they did only one week ago.

Likewise, oysters for turkey dressing have experienced a 50 per cent increase in price within a week. They will sell for 5 cents a quart, instead of 30 cents, as a week ago. This is explained by the severe storms in the east, which have not only delayed transportation, but have also tied up the oyster basins more or less, thus cutting down production by the oyster gatherers and making oysters comparatively scarce on the western market.

**Potatoes Go Up.**  
Potatoes, so delicious on Turkey day when served mashed with giblet gravy, also are mounting in price, the dealers say. Although still quoted retail at 20 cents a peck, they have gone up in wholesale price, and there is every prospect of a 10 cent increase per peck within a few days, and market prices of \$1 to \$1.25 before long, due to potato shortage, due to the wet growing season, is declared to be the cause.

Holly, mistletoe and other Christmas decorations are other reasonable items higher in price than last year. Holly is selling at 25 cents a bushel, and mistletoe will soon be on the retail market at a figure considerably higher than last year. Evergreen rope is 5 cents a yard, which is quite a price raise over last Christmas, and it is not very good, either, the dealers admit.

One of the best decorative articles to buy, they say, is Japanese fringed, a vegetable fiber article dyed red and green, which makes an ideal holiday decoration and keeps from year to year. It comes in rope form at 3 cents a yard, and also in wreaths and other designs.

**Apples Higher.**  
Boxed apples, so enjoyable at this season, are fine, but are selling at 50 cents to \$1 higher than a year ago. The trouble is that the better grades and varieties are scarce and the bulk of the production has been sent to eastern markets.

Although our old staple friend, butter, is now priced the same as a week ago, \$1 cents a pound for the best in either package or bulk form, it is still high enough to thoroughly stimulate the butterine sales, market men say. Since butter rose from 25 cents per pound, the butterine sales have increased at least one-third, and are now a vigorous market feature and gaining daily.

**Turkeys Twenty-Five Cents.**  
As to the turkey itself, Manager Louis Hinatok of Hayden's meat department says that if the weather remains as it now is, the price will continue about 25 cents a pound for the best, the same as last Christmas and last week.

Although not much fresh poultry has come in yet and that commodity is still scarce on the market, there will probably be plenty of it for Christmas, as the really fresh poultry usually comes late to market, but in sufficient quantities.

Chickens are still 15 cents a pound, geese 17 1/2 cents and ducks 20 cents, for the strictly fresh kind, with good chances of remaining at those figures over the Christmas marketing days. The cold storage variety are, of course, cheaper. Pork is quite cheap now, compared to a month ago, chops now costing only 12 1/2 cents a pound, instead of 17 1/2 cents, as at Thanksgiving time. Beef prices show no change, rounds being 17 1/2 cents, sirloin 20 cents, porterhouse 27 1/2 cents and pot roasts, 10 and 12 1/2 cents a pound. Lamb prices have been steady for three weeks, hindquarters selling at 15 1/2 cents and forequarters at 10 cents a pound.

**Bacon Is Thin.**  
Fancy bacon is now priced at 25 1/2 to 30 cents a pound, averaging rather thin, with not any great production. The best hams sell for 17 1/2 cents a pound. Now mince meat, made without any meat, is 12 1/2 cents a pound, the same as before.

Nuts are one kind of Christmas food that will be plentiful, choice and quite cheap, says Manager A. King of Hayden's grocery department. Walnuts, filberts, Brazils, pecans and almonds are fresh, attractive stock and all sell at 17 1/2 cents a pound.

Choice apple cider, with just the right "tang" to it, is plentiful and priced at a quarter a gallon.  
Oranges and grape fruit offer another hope to the Yuletide marketer. California navel oranges are coming in better than for years, Manager King says, their flavor and color being extra good, and the prices ranging from 15 to 20 cents a dozen. Florida grape fruit also are choice and very cheap just now.

**Grapes Are Tempting.**  
Fancy grapes are temptingly offered, red emperors at 12 1/2 cents and imported Malaga at 20 cents a pound.  
The market also affords all sorts of fresh vegetables for the turkey dinner. Louisiana furnishes beets, carrots, turnips, radishes and shalots or onions, at 4 cents a bunch. From California come head lettuce at 7 1/2 cents a head, cauliflower at 7 1/2 cents, tomatoes at 10 cents and Brussels sprouts at 17 cents a pound. These are choice and plentiful.

Strictly fresh country eggs are now 25 cents a dozen, or 1 cent cheaper than a week ago. Storage eggs are 25 cents.

Among the staples, flour is off 20 cents a barrel, and sells retail at from \$1.35 to \$1.50 per sack. The sugar market is stronger and up 20 points, making 100-pound sacks sell for \$4.50, wholesale. Good Santos coffees are scarce.
