Schleindi told of meeting Kaenig, who, he said, used an alias last May, according to detectives, and having kept in touch with the German consul here since the opening of the war. The prisoner, who said he was a German reservist, declared that when he met Koenig at an uptown hotel arrangements were made for him to obtain cablegrams and other documents at the National City bank. For this work, Schleindle told the poitce, he has been receiving about \$15 a week. Police claim today that they found among Koenig's effects, papers indicating that he had had relations with

Schleindl. The arrests of Schleindl, Koenig and Richard Emil Leyenbecker, a New York antique dealer, were directly due to a nfession made several weeks ago by which the Berlin cabinet assumed in the George Fuchs of New York, a relative

of Koenig. Schleindl was held in \$25,000 ball for examination Monday when arraigned today before a police magistrate on a short affidavit charging suspicion of grand larceny in connection with the sappearance from the National City bank of papers and documents which the police said were valued at \$100,000.

PLOT TO BUIN WELLAND CANAL

Paul Koenig and Three Other Men

Are Arrested in New York. NEW YORK, Dec. 18.-Charged with conspiring in a military enterprise to destroy the Welland canal, the Canadian waterway which connects Lake Eric and Lake Outario, three men are under arrest here today awaiting arrangement before a United States commissioner, while a fourth man is in the custody of the government authorities. Those under

Paul Koenig, formerly head of the bureau of investigation of the Hamburg-American line, who, it is charged, has been the head of the German secret service in the United States since the beginning of the war. Richard E. Lyendecker, a retailer of art

goods in this city, a naturalised American, alleged to have been employed by Frederick Metzler of Jersey City, re

ported to have been a clerk in the offices of the Hamburg-American line and secretary to Koenig. The feurth man held in custody is George Fuchs, who was formerly

Keenig's employ and who has given the authorities valuable information, So far as is known, he is not alleged to

a party to any conspiracy. The arrests were made last night under the direction of the agents of the Department of Justice.

The evidence which led to the arrest of the three defendants, was given by George Fuchs, who, it is charged, quarreled with Koenig over the payment of \$15, which he claims Koenig owed him. The purpose of the alleged attempt to block the canal was, it is charged, to prevent the movement of supplies down the Grent Lakes and through the Welland canal and St. Lawrence river to the entente ailies.

The names of workers in San Francisco, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Boston and other cities are said to have been discovered among documents seized by the authorities in a raid upon the offices

of Keenig and Lyendecker. The penalty for the crime charged in this case is three years in prison, or \$1,009 fine, or both.

When a man or a woman with very little business experience wants a safe and profitable investment-It's a pretty good plan to follow the example of executors of

estates, and others holding trust funds. Men in such positions will only put the money given into their care into investments that are properly safeguarded and yield a

A form of investment that ranks very high with them is apartment buildings in large cities,

Let us see how an apartment building compares with some other form of investment. Suppose your are considering the purpose of a four-family, frame flat, valued at \$16,000. Such a building is assumed to have

a commercial life of forty years. Suppose at the same time that you could invest your \$16,000

in standard, tax free, 5 per cent bonds, running forty years. Both investments are competing for your money. How will

you decide which is the more favorable? To begin with, every investor is entitled to safety, and the return of his capital with interest,

The bond investment will return you \$800 interest each year, with a return of the principal in a lump sum at the end of the term, all without expense of collection or management.

The flat investment is more complex, requires more close figuring and careful attention; but if wisely chosen, its returns are apt to be much larger.

Next week's talk will be given over to standard methods of figuring the returns from apartment house investments.
