Mrs. Harry Wilkins and children arrived this morning from Chicago to spend the holidays with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Colpeter.

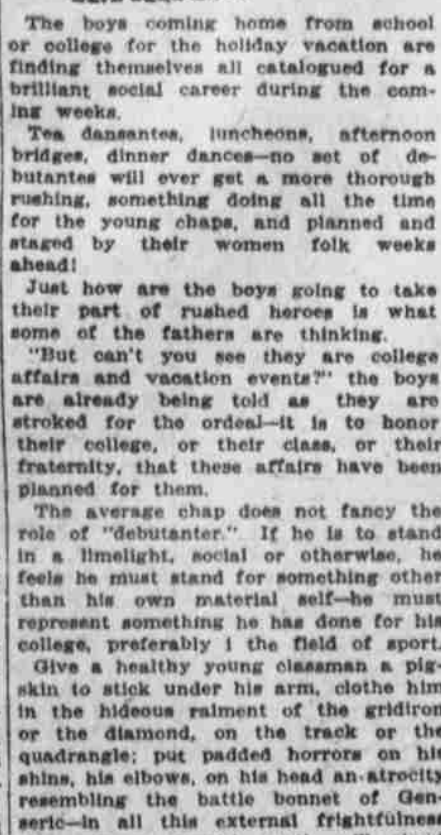
