VILLA TURNS ON OWN GENERALS AS THEY YIELD

Former Head of Rebellion Hides in Mountains with 400 Armed Men Prepared to Fight Former Army.

NORTHERN POWER SURRENDERS

Border States and Forces to Carranza in Return for Mercy to All but Two.

U. S. OFFERS PANCHO ASYLUM

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 20.—General Francisco Villa, with 400 armed men, it is believed, is somewhere in the mountains of Chihuahua state, prepared to oppose his former organization.

The Carranza de facto government is in official control of the former Villa state of Chihuahua by virtue of an agreement between Generals Roberto Limon, Manuel Banda, Lieutenant Colonel Flaviano Paliza and Colonel Eduardo Andalon, and Carranza General Andres Garcia, by which 4,000 troops and the organization of the Villa government, including the cities of Juarez and Chihuahua and all border points, accept the Carranza domination. The agreement grants amnesty to all but General Villa and his brother, Hipolito Villa.

To Leave Alone.
The generals entered into conference yesterday as delegates from General Villa to confer with the Carranza consul, Andres G. Garcia upon the plan to transfer the entire territory and all troops and arms, 4,000 men, and for himself to leave the capital without any following.

They reported late last night the result of their conference to General Villa at Chihuahua.

Late today they had received no reply from General Villa and instead learned that after receiving their advice General Villa gathered 400 or 500 men and left the capital and that his whereabouts were unknown.

Upon opening the conference with the Carranza consul today the delegates announced that they would proceed upon the unrestricted authorization as given by General Villa. They said they believed he feared that the delegates would not be able to secure him immunity from prosecution should he cross the international line.

Washington, Dec. 20.—Gratification and relief were frankly displayed by administration officials today when news came from El Paso that seven of General Villa's generals and leaders signed an agreement to turn the rebel army of the north over to the de facto government of Mexico. Confidence is felt here in the reported promise of Villa to eliminate himself and if he appears on the American side of the international boundary line he will find a free road.

Villa's withdrawal and the incorporation of his army into that of the de facto government are regarded here as indicative of early peace in Mexico, and at least will pave the way for reducing materially the strong patrol the United States has been obliged to maintain.

Huntington Wilson and Mrs. Lucille Powell Are Married

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20.—Huntington Wilson, former assistant secretary of state and Mrs. Lucille Powell, divorced wife of Frederick James Powell, New York lawyer, were married here last Tuesday and kept the fact a secret until today.

They were married by a justice of the peace and the only witnesses were Mr. and Mrs. William Sharon of San Francisco, and John Newlands, son of Francis G. Newlands, United States senator from Nevada.

The couple are prominent socially in New York, Newport and Washington. Both recently obtained divorce decrees at Reno.

SAYS SCHMIDT IS LEADER IN PLOT

Star Witness for State in Los Angeles Dynamite Case Tells Story to Jury.

OTHERS WANTED TO BACK OUT

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20.—Mathew A. Schmidt was the leading, and not a subordinate, figure in the conspiracy which resulted in the blowing up of the Los Angeles Times building with twenty men five years ago, according to the testimony of Donald Vose, the detective who was placed on his trail five years ago and who appeared today as the star witness in Schmidt's trial on a charge of murder.

Schmidt, Vose declared, recounted at the home of Emma Goldman in New York, on September 23, 1914, his part in the dynamite plot and asserted that he had carried it forward in spite of Anton Johannessen, a San Francisco building trades organizer, who called a meeting of labor leaders and then advised that it be called off.

Vose, who admitted on the witness stand that his real name was Donald Voss Meserve, was the man who caused the arrest of Schmidt in New York in February last.

German Prepares to Smash "War Babies"

BERLIN (Via London), Dec. 20.—The debate in the Reichstag of the government's measure to prepare the way for a post bellum tax on all war profits, by requiring companies and corporations to extend itself into a discussion of methods to recover for the state undue or excessive profits on war contracts.

SENSATION REPORT ON VICE IN STATE

Commission of Inquiry Says Children Separated from Mothers Buried in Heaps by Wholesale.

FIVE THOUSAND IN ONE PLACE
Immorality Declared to Be as Rampant as Before "Red Light" Zone Closed.

CONDITIONS AMONG WORKERS

BALTIMORE, Dec. 20.—In an exhaustive detailed report the state-wide vice commission, named by Governor Goldborough in January, 1913, today made public the results of its inquiry.

Probably the most sensational of the features dealt with in the report is the alleged traffic in babies. It is asserted that investigations found there are institutions in Baltimore to which the mother of an illegitimate child may consign her offspring upon the payment of an agreed sum and forever rid herself of legal responsibility for it.

Buried in Heaps.
Of the hundreds of children so taken in charge by the institutions the commission avers that 80 to 90 per cent die and are buried in heaps in small plots of ground, one such plot approximately fifty-five feet square having been the tomb of 5,000 babies since 1888.

Conditions in Working Places.
Much attention is given to social conditions in factories, stores and many instances are given of immorality forced upon girls by their employers or their superiors at their places of employment, the penalty of refusal being the loss of their position.

Threat to Close Banks in Mexico Arouses Protest

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Closure of foreign banks in Mexico City and destruction of Mexican credit are predicted in official communications today to the State department from some of the European embassies, should Carranza carry out his intention of forcibly compelling the banks to redeem their notes in gold immediately when presented by the government.

LARGE QUANTITY OF WOOL IN WYOMING SOLD

DOUGLAS, Wyo., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Two hundred and twenty-seven thousand pounds of stored wool has been sold in Niobrara, Converse and Natrona counties during the last week at prices averaging 25 cents per pound. The clips sold as follows: Williams Sheep company, 90,000 pounds; Converse county; Albert Rochelle, 75,000 pounds; Bonnell & Henry, 75,000 pounds; J. M. Cattle company, 75,000 pounds; all in Niobrara county; Nat Quinn, 3,000 pounds, Natrona county. About 1,000,000 pounds of stored wool has been sold in this district during the last three weeks and very little remains in the warehouses.

GAS COMPANY EMPLOYEES ASPHYXIATED AT PLANT

IOWA FALLS, Ia., Dec. 20.—(Special Telegram.)—Frank Kramer and I. G. White of the Iowa Gas company were asphyxiated here this afternoon while at work at the plant. White had gone into an oil tank to make some repairs and was overcome with gas. Kramer sought to rescue him and suffered the same fate. The bodies were recovered this evening. Both were married and leave large families.

ALLIES GIVE IT UP WHEN DARDANELLES ARE ALL BUT FORCED

Turk Officers Say French and British Fleet Withdrew in March as Straits at Mercy of Guns.

DEFENDERS READY TO FLEE

Ramparts Crumbling and Ottoman's Ammunition Just About Exhausted.

THEN ENTENTE SHIPS RETIRED

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) VIENNA, Nov. 20.—Had the allied fleet returned to its attack upon the Dardanelles batteries on the day after the great bombardment of March 19 last, the waterway to Constantinople would have been surely forced, in the opinion of a number of artillery officers of the defense works near Tschanek Kale, expressed to the Associated Press correspondent who has just come from the Dardanelles front to Vienna.

One of the principal batteries had for three of its large calibre guns just four armor piercing shells each which might end the tremendous effort of the British and French fleet. It appeared.

For the fourth gun five shells were left, making for the entire battery a total of seventeen projectiles of the sort which the aggressors had to fear. What this meant is best understood when it is considered that the battery in question was the one which had to be given the widest berth by the allied fleet.

Told to Pack.
During the evening of March 18, the Associated Press correspondent talked to several artillery officers from the battery in question.

"Pack and be ready to quit at daybreak," said one of them.

"Why?"
"Oh, they are sure to get in tomorrow."

The officer stated his reasons. He was so sure that the British and French would return in the morning to finish their task that there was no question in his mind as to the propriety of discussing the ammunition matter.

"We'll hold well enough to make them think that there is no end to our supply of ammunition," he said. "But it can't be done if they go about their work in earnest. With our heavy pieces unless they can reduce the batteries on the other shore without trouble. The case looks hopeless. You had better take my advice."

Sweet Leaves Rock Island for Denver & Rio Grande

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Arthur E. Sweet was elected vice president and general manager in charge of operation at a special meeting of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad directors in this city today.

U. S. Protests to Britain Upon Holding Up Mail for Sweden

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The United States has protested to Great Britain against interference with parcel post shipments between this country and Sweden, Secretary Lansing announced today.

Mexican Revolution Ends After Nearly Ten Years of Violence

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 20.—The Mexican revolution, which was practically ended today so far as the Villa organization is concerned, began in 1917 with the activities of Antonio Villarreal and the Mascoon brothers, looking toward the ousting of the late Porfirio Diaz as president. Villa gained prominence as a military leader through assistance rendered Francisco Madero in the operations preceding the departure of Diaz from Mexico in 1911.

BRITONS LEAVE TWO DISTRICTS ON DARDANELLES

Official Announcement Says that Troops Have Been Withdrawn from Anzac Cove and Suvla Bay Regions.

TEUTONS ACTIVE IN FLANDERS

Attack on English Trenches Near Ypres Under Cloud of Gas is Repulsed.

ARTILLERY DUELS CONTINUE

(BULLETIN.) LONDON, Dec. 20.—Operations in other sectors of the front on the Gallipoli peninsula than those from which troops were announced today to have been withdrawn are to be continued, it is intimated in an official statement issued tonight. The withdrawal was effected without the knowledge of the movement on the part of the Turks it is declared.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Withdrawal of the British troops from the Anzac Cove and Suvla Bay regions of the Gallipoli peninsula, is announced in a brief communication given out here this afternoon.

Beyond the statement that the movement was effected successfully with small losses, few details are given and no allusion is made to the allied forces on the Seddul Bahr front, at the tip of the peninsula.

Some indication of the long expected offensive by the Germans in Flanders, where the massing of Teutonic troops is said to have been in progress for several weeks, is contained in official British and French reports, which state that under a cloud of gas Germans attacked British trenches northeast of Ypres. According to these reports, the Germans failed so completely that few of them emerged from their own trenches, and those who did were mowed down by artillery fire.

Second Attack Repulsed.
The attack was delivered in the early morning. Later in the day the Germans displayed unusual activity, directing a heavy bombardment on the British lines near Ypres and on the French positions at Mesines. Mines were exploded before the trenches at Armentieres and German infantry attempted unsuccessfully to occupy the craters thus opened.

Along the remainder of the western front the interminable artillery duels continue, with the French guns near St. Mihiel developing an intense fire.

The Russian and Macedonian fronts, so far as the public is advised, are in a state of comparative quiescence.

The position of Greece is still regarded with keen anxiety on both sides. The Journal party is reported victorious in the Greek elections, but the expected change in leaders is not accepted as implying a different foreign policy. England is impatiently awaiting the crossing of the Greek frontier to see whether Greece will leave the Saloniki area free for a struggle on which the Greeks would become impassive spectators.

Father of Girl is Accused of Murder

PARIS, Dec. 20.—T. R. Walton, father of Pauline Walton, 17, who was murdered in her home early Saturday morning, was arrested today and formally charged with the murder of his daughter.
