

ALLIES BUY LARGE ORDERS OF WHEAT

Four Hundred Thousand Bushels Bought on Local Exchange in Two Days.

PRICES MOVE UP A LITTLE

Omaha wheat sales of Monday and Tuesday for export will reach close to 400,000 bushels, the Updike Grain company alone having sold 200,000 during the two days. With this large quantity going out, there are still a number of orders that have not been filled, though the wheat is in the elevators here.

Prices took another bulge, wheat advancing 1 to 3 cents, the price going to \$1.14 for the best grades. The bulk of the sales, however, were made around \$1.00 to \$1.05. Receipts were thirty-nine carloads.

Corn was erratic, the prices ranging from 4 to 5 cents per bushel, being a cent lower to a cent higher. Receipts were eighty-five cars.

There were twenty-seven cars of oats on the market, with the price 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower. Sales were made at 38 to 43 cents per bushel.

It is known that Mr. Lomax had been in poor health for some time, but his condition was not such as to give his friends any alarm. He had been at his office every day and had been able to look after business.

Mr. Lomax is about 60 years of age. For a number of years he was general passenger agent of the Union Pacific here. He came to the company September 1, 1897, and resigned June 10, 1910, to become passenger traffic manager of the Western Pacific, a position that he still holds.
