

FOR YOUR CHRISTMAS DINNER

DRY PICKED TURKS BEST IN FLAVOR

Pork and Beef Both Cheaper Than Last Year—Nuts Cost a Little More.

NAVEL ORANGES ARE FINE

Turkeys dry-picked retain their flavor better than those scalded before packing, at least so says Louis Binstock, head of the meat department of Hayden Bros. Binstock explains that when a bird is dry-picked the pores close immediately after the feathers are withdrawn, while when a bird is first scalded the pores remain open after the feathers are removed, with the consequence that in steaming in the roaster the delicate flavors escape constantly from thousands of small openings like this.

Nice, fresh, dry-picked turkeys, white as snow, are selling at 21 cents a pound. Frozen turkeys, that is, storage turkeys, are on the markets at 16 1/2 to 17 1/2 cents a pound.

Ducks are 15 cents a pound. Geese are very scarce, but selling at 17 1/2 cents a pound.

Chickens are 17 1/2 cents a pound, with fancy broilers going at 25 cents. Oysters are higher than a week or two ago, and are now selling at 40 cents a quart. When they advanced in the wholesale markets in the east a week or so ago, it was announced that the stern in the east put an end to the oyster fisheries for a few days and thus caused the price to advance.

Christmas Lamb is Here

Christmas lambs are on the market also, and hindquarters are selling at 12 1/2, while forequarters are selling at 14 cents.

Nice steer rib roasts may be had at 17 1/2 cents a pound, which is 1/2 cent cheaper than last Christmas. Fancy pork roasts may be had at 10 cents. These were 10 1/2 cents a year ago.

Mince meat is 17 1/2 cents a pound. Cranberries are 10 cents a quart, which is a little higher than last year.

Nuts are a little higher than last year, most grades selling at 17 1/2 cents a pound, while a year ago they could be had at 15 cents.

Navel oranges were never finer than this Christmas. They come with a better color, a finer flavor, and more sweet than in former years. They sell for from 50 to 40 cents a dozen, depending upon grade.

Flour is up 20 cents wholesale, but is still retailing at \$1.35 a sack. Sugar is still selling seventeen pounds for a dollar. Fresh eggs are down 3 cents, selling now at 22 cents a dozen. Storage eggs are still 31 cents a dozen. Butter is 21 cents a pound.

Harvester Trust Will Share Profits With Employees

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—The International Harvester company announced a plan to assist its 35,000 employees to become stockholders and sharers in the company's profits.

Under the plan, which becomes effective tomorrow, all employees will have an opportunity to purchase profit sharing certificates in the company, payments for which will be made in monthly installments from their salaries. These certificates, it is provided, may be converted into stock at a rate below market value.

To every employee who takes advantage of the offer before March 1, 1916, the company will add to his payments 1 per cent of his earnings annually.

Interest will be paid at the rate of 5 per cent per annum on all employees' payments and credits on his profit sharing certificates. In addition to the annual dividends on stock, the company also will pay to the employee an amount equal to the extra dividend which he would receive upon the stock, if the entire excess of the net profits for each year prior to 1917, over an amount equal to 4 per cent of the money invested in the company's business during the year, were distributed pro-rata to all holders of its common stock.

Provision is made for postponement of payments in case of illness or unavoidable layoff. Certificates can be turned into cash at the will of the employee. The plan will terminate in January, 1921.

Air Pilots Will Be Given Lessons in Care of Motors

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—A plan by which members of the aviation corps of the United States army and navy will be enabled to obtain three months training in automobile shops in the handling of motors has been arranged by members of the naval advisory board and of the Automobile Club of America. The announcement was made by H. F. Coffin, chairman of the committee on production, organization, manufacture and standardization, in connection with the meeting here of the naval advisory board.

"During the present war," said Mr. Coffin, "no power has been able to keep more than 20 per cent of its aeroplanes in operation at one time. One of the greatest difficulties has been the training of a sufficient number of air pilots in the repair of motors, which is one of the most essential parts of an aviator's knowledge."

"Some time ago we suggested this plan to the Automobile Club of America. We have received word that the plan was agreed to with enthusiasm and that all of the large automobile manufacturers had offered their plants as laboratories for government aviators. It will take about three months to give an aviator a good foundation in the running of

motors. This plan will enable us in case of trouble to train a thousand or thousands of men in this branch of aviation within three months."

The committee also plans to attempt to have all makers of aeroplanes agree upon standards so that in case of war all parts to planes might be expedited by the standardization of parts. At present all machines are built upon radically different plans, which makes the repairing of the various types a serious problem.

CHIEF FUZZY DOG FOUND LUGGING LARGE CANNON

Chief Fuzzy Dog of Oklahoma City, who has been busking near Pender, Neb., arrived in Omaha Tuesday with plenty of "jack" and a raging thirst for firewater. As he entered headquarters a revolver, slightly smaller than a Teuton stage gun, fell from his hip pocket and shook the foundations of the city.
