JUDGE HIATT IS DEAD AT CAPITAL

Former Probate Official of Harlan County Meets Death in Washington City.

POLITICS OF NEBRASKA

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 1 .- (Special Telegram.)-Judge Jesse M. Hlatt, former judge of the probate court of Harlan county, Nebraska., and latter connected with the census office for many years, died in this city yesterday and the funeral services will be held at the family residence, 1323 Harvard street Northwest, Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

While a native of Indiana, born in 1838. Judge Hiatt moved to Iowa in 1875 and in 1879 be located in Alma, Harian county, Nebraska, entering upon the practice of his profession in that state. Two years later he was editor of the Harlan County Herald and in 1552 he established with his son, John Clinton Hlatt, the Alma Tribune. In this year he was appointed county attorney of Harlan county.

The republican state convention of Nebraska in 1883 nominated Judge Hiatt for membership in the Board of Regents of Nebraska university and he was elected by about 58,000 majority. He also was made a member of the republican state central committee.

He was elected probate judge of Harlan county in 1886 and re-elected in 1887. Judge Hiatt always was deeply interested in Alma, Neb., where early in 1882 he was commander of Van Meter Post, Grand Army of the Republic, was re-elected

Judge Hiatt was a Royal Arch Mason and an Odd Fellow, being affiliated with More Bonds Bought lodges of the organization at Alma.

Alleged Heirs of Nichols Desire to Name Administrator

AURORA, Neb., Jan. 1 .- (Special.)-Judge W. L. Stark of Aurora was finally selected by Nelson H. Tunnicliff of New York City and W. F. Button of Hastings as the proper man for administrator of the estate of Alden S. Nichols, who died h Aurora about a month ago. Nichols left a considerable estate, but had no heirs in this part of the country

County Attorney Whitney asked for the appointment of T. E. Williams, president of the First National bank, as temporary administrator. Mr. Williams was the closest friend of the dead man and was his financial adviser. When Tunnicliff and Button came to Aurora Thursday they asked Williams to take the administratorship providing he would not select certain attorneys as his attorneys. He declared that if appointed administrator and he needed an attorney he would make his own selection. Then Judge Stark was called in. After being closeted with Tunnicliff and Button for some time they announced that Stark was satisfactory, and they filed a petition asking for his appointment.

Tunnicliff declares that he has a con tract with the heirs back in Massachusetts, but insists that he is not to get so large a percentage as 50 per cent of the paving bonds for \$100,000, Omaha park estate for finding them. The fact that the two men claiming the estate also want to control the legal adviser of the Omaha bonds for \$147,000. administrator has been the subject of much adverse comment.

SALONIKI, Jan. 1.-(Via Paris, delayed.)-A French aeroplane squadron returning from a reconnaissance today dropped a bomb by error on the Greek camp, wounding one soldier. General Sarrail, the French commander made auitable explanations.

A news agency dispatch received by way of London Fildsy night, said that during a raid over Salon'ki by a Tuetonic aeroplane a bomb was dropped on the Greek camp just outside the town, killing a shepperd. It was stated that the Greek camp apparently was mistaken for entente headquarters.

GOVERNOR HAMMOND'S BODY TAKEN TO ST. PAUL

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 1.-The body of Governor Winfield Scott Hammond was brought here today from Clinton, La., where the governor died Thursday.

As the funeral cortege moved through the downtown streets to the capitol. where the governor's body will lie in state tomorrow, crowds lined the sidewalks and hundreds of citizens joined in the procession, despite a sleety downpour.

Manley Green. TABOR, Ia., Jan. 1 .- (Special.) - Manley Green died in the Clarinda hospital on Wednesday after a prolonged illness. The body was brought here fore burial, the funeral services being held in the Saints' church Friday at 10:30 a. m. Hog Cholera Fight In Gage and Johnson Is Most Successful

TECUMSEH. Neb., Jan. 1 .- (Special.) --The hog cholera preventive work that is several assistants, the assistants at Te- lature. cumseh being Drs. D. W. Hurst and J. A. Grau

From data these men have collected it is shown that the hog cholera loss in the Nebraska territory described was 6,000 hogs in the year 1913. Active work was ot begun by the government men here until April, 1914, and the year closed with a cholera loss of approximately 3,500 hogs, or 2.500 less than was lost the year before, and many of these died early in the year before the veterinarians had gotten the work well under way. The total loss of hogs in the territory for the year 1915 will be about 1,000 hogs. one-sixth the number being lost without the preventive measures. Dr. Cosford and his assistants have received very good co-operation in the work by the farmers, this being absolutely necessary. During the last two weeks they have been holding meetings at school houses over the Johnson county line in Nemaha and Otoe counties. If the best results are to be obtained here it is necessary to prevent the disease near the county

By Commonwealth In the Biennium

LINCOLN, Jan. 21 .- (Special.)-Bonds surchased by the state and registered in the office of the state auditor for the period beginning December 1, 1914, and the same date of 1915 amounts to \$3,494,317.21 and is far in excess of the two previous blenniums, taking into consideration that but half of the present biennium is yet to come. The biennium or 1911-12 showed \$4,716,136.39 registered, while the 1913-14 blennium showed \$4,492,831.98 registered. The report of Auditor Smith gives the bonds purchased by the state for investment as follows:


