AMERICAN TELLS OF SINKING OF PERSIA

Charles Grant of Boston Says Ship Listed So Quickly Boats on One Side Could Not Be Used.

FLOATS HOURS ON WRECKAGE

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Jan. 4 .-(Via London.)-Charles Grant of Boston, one of the two Americans known to have been on board the British steamer Persia when it was torpedoed in the Mediterranean last Thursday, has arrived in Alexandria. Mr. Grant, so far as is known, is the only American from whom can come the story of the Persia's sinking. He gave to the Associated Press today the most detailed account of the disanter yet received,

"I was in the dining saloon of the Persia at 1:05 s. m.," he said. "I just had finished my soup and the stewart was asking what I would take for my second course, when a terrific explosion occurred.

The saloon became filled with smoke, broken glass and steam from the boilers, which appeared to have burst. There was no panic on board. We went on deck as though we were at drill and reported at the life boats on the starboard side, as the vessel had listed to port. I clung to the railing. The last thing done was to toe on Captain Strickly's life belt.

Affont on Wreckage Three Hours. "As the vessel was then listing so badly that it was impossible to launch the starboard boats, I alid down the starboard rail into the water. I caught in a rope which pulled off a shoe, but I broke loos; and climbed on some floating wreckage, to which I clung.

"The last I saw of the Persia it had its bow in the air, five minutes after the ex-

"After floating about on the wreckage until 4 o'clock in the morning, I saw five boats. I was pulled into one of them. We rowed about looking for stragglers.

"The boats became overloaded and the occupants were redistributed. Four boats were tied together by their painters and the fifth followed some distance away. Picked Up by Cruiser.

"My boat left the others in order to search the more frequented steamship channels for help. We rowed for three hours. Then we saw a cruiser and called out 'We are English.' We explained that we were survivors of the Persia and gave other boats were. They were soon found and the occupants were taken off immediately by the English sailors.

"Robert McNeely, American consul at Aden, sat at the same table with me on the voyage. He was not seen, probably because his cabin was on the port side.

"It was a horrible scene. The water was black as ink. Some passengers were screaming, others were calling out good-bye. Those in one boat sang hymns."



BULGARIANS ASK

They Insist that Their Part of Bargain Completed and Balk on Attacking Saloniki.

ASK ANOTHER SLICE OF GREECE

LONDON, Jan. 4 .- "The Bulgarians are reluctant to take the risk of employing their whole army in the Saloniki enterprise," says the Athens correspondent of the Daily Mail. He continues:

"They claim that with the conquest of Serbia and the reopening of the rallway between Beigrade and Constantinople, their part of the bargain is completed. They are distnclined to become Germany's cats-paw unless a fresh arrangement is made, including a territorial reward in Greek Macedonia, which Germany is unable to promise. situation is eausing great perplexity in Berlin and Vienna."

Germans Dominate Administration. The Halkun correspondent of the Times sends a dispatch in which he declares that the Bulgarian officials are in complete subjection to German jurisdiction. He says that every department of the Bulgarian administration is under control of German officers, whose permission is necessary for the transaction of

the simplest business. He continues: "In order to strengthen the verman hold on Bulgaria and Turkey and to spare their own men, the Germans alm at employing native troops so far as possible on foreign service and in pursuance of this policy, will employ Turkish as well as Bulgarian troops for an advance on Saloniki. The delay in this attack is not due to the difficulty in bringing up troops and supplies, but to the reluctance of Greece to open its frontier, in fear that the Bulgarian soldiers will take revenge for the events of June, 1913. The prospect of re-entering Saloniki, however, is the only remaining inducement Germany can offer Bulgaria for continued participation in the war, and if this is refused, the incipient peace movement in Bulgaria will make rapid progress with the result that the next few months may witness a strong reaction in Bulgarian

German Marks Are Under Nineteen Cents

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.-Exchange or Germany today fell to 75%, the lowest quotation since the outbreak of the war and probably without precedent in the financial relations between this center

and Berlin. The unit of exchange on Germany is 4 marks, so that today's quotation implies a value of only about 18% cents for marks, as against the normal value of about 23% cents.

On the other hand, remittances to London attained their highest rates in demand sterling being quoted at 4.74%.
