

### GRAIN SHIPMENTS FROM OMAHA HEAVY

Hundred Thirty-Five Cars Wheat and Hundred Eighty Cars Corn Sold on Local Exchange.

### CATTLE FEEDERS BUY CORN

While Omaha grain receipts were light and below the normal, the shipments were about the heaviest of any day during the last five years.

Receipts were: Wheat, 43; corn, 52; oats, 14 car-loads. In contrast to these receipts, the shipments were:

Wheat, 135 cars; corn, 180; oats, 33. On the corresponding date last year the shipments were:

Wheat, 51; corn, 60; oats, 6.

### Buying Corn in Large Quantities.

Heavy shipments at this time, so far as the corn is concerned, is due to the fact that northern Iowa, southern Minnesota and Illinois feeders of hogs and cattle are taking about all the corn they can get hold of.

Wheat Goes to Europe. The strong export demand caused large sales of wheat, most of it going to England and France, and the bulk of it through the gulf ports.

There was no reaction in the price of wheat. The market continues strong and wheat sold at \$1.048 1/2 per bushel, practically the same as Monday.

Corn was strong on account of the demand and advanced two cents, sales being made all the way between 50 to 70 cents per bushel. Seventy cents was top and was for old corn.

Oats fluctuated, being 1/4 cent up to 14 cents down. The prices ranged from 27 to 4 1/2 cents per bushel.

### COLOMBIAN TREATY PACT BRYAN THEME

Former Secretary Urges Ratification of Instrument Giving Little Republic Big Sum.

### BRAZILIAN AVIATOR SPEAKS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Speakers before the numerous divisions and subdivisions of the Pan-American scientific congress today included former Secretary Bryan John Bassett Moore, Alberto Santos Dumont, the Brazilian aeronaut, and George E. Roberts of New York.

A plea for Pan-American unity in the event of war between any country beyond the seas and any American nation was made by Mr. Dumont.

### Plans for Protection.

"We should be able in case of trouble," he said, "to intimidate any European power contemplating war against any one of us, not by guns—of which we have so few—but by the strength of our union."

Mr. Bryan, in his address, endorsed the recent suggestion by Secretary Lansing that an agreement be entered into by the American republics for settlement of boundary disputes and the prohibition of the shipment of arms to revolutionists.

Mr. Bryan also expressed hope that the pending treaty, by which the United States would pay Colombia \$25,000,000 for the partition of Panama, soon would be ratified.

Colombians Feared. In Colombia, according to advices to the legation here, surprise and some resentment are being shown at the failure of the United States to ratify the treaty, and the Colombia press has had much to say lately of the delay.
