Attorney General Reed Enjoins Oil Companies from Enjoining Harman.

HOPES TO SUPERSEDE SUITS

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 8 .- (Special.) -- As counter action to the suits brought by certain oil companies yesterday in Omaha to restrain Deputy State Oil Commis sioner C. E. Harman, from collecting inspection fees for inspecting their pro duct, Attorney General Reed in behalf of the state and the oil department, made application to the supreme court today for an injunction to restrain the Standard Oil company, the National Refining company, the Cudahy Packing company and Cudahy Refining company, the Manhattan Oil company, the S. L. Collins Oil company, the State Oil company, the Marshall Oil company, the B. & L. Oil company, the A. B. A. Oll company and the L. V. Nichols Oil company, from interfering with the duties of the oil department in carrying out the laws of the state regarding the inspections of il. The application recites that a tempor

ary injunction has been granted in the district court of Douglas county restraining the commission and its officers from collection of inspection fees and that all of the inspection fees be paid to the clerk of the district court of Douglas county to be held until the litigation between the Nicholas Oil company and the commission and its officers is finally determined.

The application of the attorney general for an injunction recites that the expense of maintaining the food, drug, dairy and oil commission is paid out of the fees collected by the department and that there is no other way to pay the Former Senator Files with Secreexpense which amounts to \$5,000 a month. Quarrels Help Some. The quarreling of the democratic state officials and departments among themelves has made extra business for the state legal department in the way of running down the law and grinding out opinions. It is true that some of the fellow democratic officials of Mr. Deed have refused to abide by the opinions emanating from the legal opinion mill operated by Mr. Reed, but he has contined to grind them out just the same, an they could "take 'em or leave 'em alone, just as they pleased.

It was no fault of the attorney general if the other state officers thought they knew more about law than he did. He was paid by the state to grind them out and he did so.
