

WILL OF GEN. DODGE FILED IN PROBATE

Majority Left to Heirs, but Sum is Set Apart for Railroad Men's Library.

HELP FOR INDIGENT VETERANS

The will of General Grenville M. Dodge was filed in probate court at Council Bluffs late yesterday afternoon. No inventory accompanied the filing, but the bequests are based upon an estimated valuation above \$600,000.

Every interest of very member of the family is carefully guarded, and there are large bequests outside of the family. The city of Council Bluffs is made the trustee to hold the sum of \$100,000 to be administered in accordance with the terms of the will.

The amount of these bequests are based upon the assumption that the estate will exceed \$600,000. The homestead on Third street in Council Bluffs is left to Mrs. Dodge and her three daughters as long as they shall live.

One-half is to be divided among the heirs, one-fourth is to go to the city of Council Bluffs to be used for the relief of civil war soldiers and one-fourth goes to Norwich university, Norwich, Vt.

The entire library of General Dodge, probably the largest in Iowa, goes to the Council Bluffs public library and his records of historical value to the Iowa Historical association.

In addition to his other bequests, Mrs. Dodge is to receive the income from the Frank S. Pusey trust fund, established in 1894, the value or purpose of which is not stated in the will.

Perkins Says Bull Moosers Will Put a Ticket in the Field

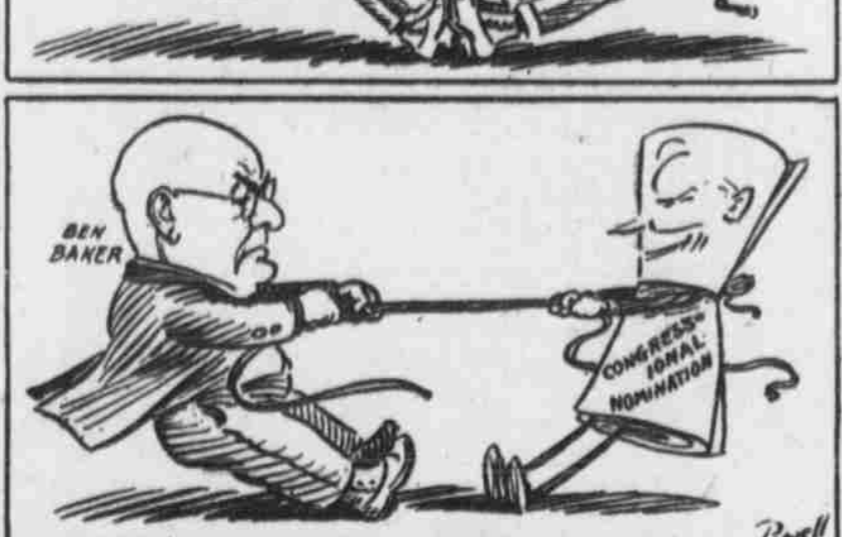
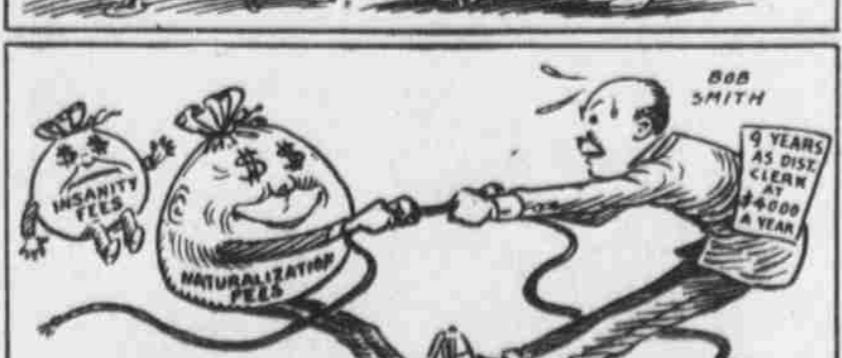
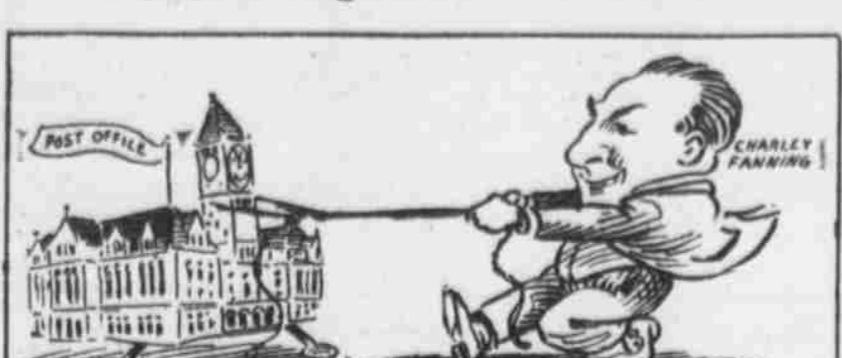

ENGLAND MAKES NEW MAN CHIEF IN MESOPOTAMIA

Turks have advanced to the main defenses of the British.

The main British army in Mesopotamia, according to these advices, is in retreat. 30,000 men having been left in Kut-el-Amarah to protect the position.

Recent dispatches have indicated that the British expedition in Mesopotamia was confronted by superior Turkish forces. The British repulsed several assaults on Kut-el-Amarah.

The retreat from Kut-el-Amarah—assuming the correctness of the official advices from Berlin—apparently means the abandonment by the British of any attempt, for the present, at least, of an offensive campaign in Mesopotamia.

It was in November, 1914, that an Anglo-Indian force, starting from the Persian gulf, began marching north and west over the desert, following the Tigris and Euphrates rivers wherever possible.

EXPLOSION IN BIG POWDER PLANT

Three Men Killed by Accidental Blast in Dupont Works at Carney's Point, N. J.

SHOCK FELT MANY MILES AWAY

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 10.—There was another explosion in the Hagley yard of the Du Pont Powder company near this city late today, but no one was injured.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10.—Three men were killed and a number injured in an explosion of smokeless powder early today at the plant of the Dupont Powder works at Carney's Point, N. J.

The cause of the explosion is not known, but according to the superintendent there is no suspicion that the blast was due to outside agencies.

One of the reports in circulation was that government agents and secret service men from the DuPont police force had been watching suspicious persons who went to the plant from Wilmington, Del., by boat and that two carrying bombs and fuses, had been arrested.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Major General Scott, chief of staff of the army, told the house military committee at the army bill hearing today, that in the event of war, the country must have an army of 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 men or "accept disaster."

General Scott said that under a service system, which laid the burden alike upon all men between 18 and 31 as a public duty, an adequate army could be maintained for what now is paid for the small standing army.

Frear Opens Fight on Pork Barrel Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Representative Frear of Wisconsin today opened his annual fight on rivers and harbors appropriations with the declaration that most of the \$50,000,000 spent thus by army engineers in 1914 and 1915 was wasted.

HIGH COURT ACTS IN MEDICINE CASE

Decision Reached After Ten Years of Legislation and Litigation.

OMAHA END TO THE MATTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—After ten years of legislation and litigation, the supreme court decided today that congress had enacted finally a constitutional law regulating statements as to the curative effects of medicines in interstate commerce.

For a time it was urged by government officials that the 1906 pure food law designated as misbranded drugs or medicines, which were accompanied in interstate commerce by knowingly false statements about the curative effects of the compounds.

Acted as Taft's Suggestion. In response to a resulting message from President Taft, congress, in 1913, enacted the Sherry amendment which the supreme court held today struck precisely at misstatements either on the label or in printed circulars accompanying the medicines.

Shipped to Omaha. The decision was announced in the case of a Chicago drug concern which shipped medicine from Chicago to Omaha, described in an accompanying circular as a compound which it knew had cured and would cure tuberculosis.
