Guttery in Lincoln to Answer Charges

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Dr. W. D. Guttery, superintendent of the Norfolk insane asylum, arrived in Lincoln this afternoon to answer the charges made by Editor Huse of Norfolk before the Board of Control Saturday.

Dr. Guttery says that if there was cruelty used against the patients, as it is alleged, he knew nothing of it and it was against his order to the employees. The board would say nothing tonight regarding the conference with Dr. Guttery, which was still on at a late hour, simply stating that as soon as the matter had been investigated the public would be given the facts.

NORFOLK, Neb., Jan. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Alleged conditions at the Nebraska State hospital for the insane at Norfolk as shown by affidavits of present and past employees are set forth today in the Norfolk News as follows: That Dr. Guttery has been cognizant of cruelties and has retained employees guilty of the acts; that the superintendent has humiliated female employees in several ways, permitting and in some cases using vulgar language in their presence; immoral acts have been reported to the superintendent and female employees involved have been retained; Dr. Guttery has taken liberties with women employees, which in one case was resented by a blow; the superintendent was careless during a smallpox epidemic and during a diphtheria epidemic in the hospital.

SUPERINTENDENT CLARK TELS OF BOYS' SCHOOL

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—According to a report filed with the governor by Superintendent Clark of the boys' industrial school at Kearney, the population of the school November 30, 1915, was eleven less than at the same time in 1914. There were received at the school 192 boys in 1915 ranging in age as follows: 10 and under 12 years..... 6 12 and under 14 years..... 23 14 and under 16 years..... 23 16 and under 18 years..... 25

Of that number three are colored boys under 16 and two under 14. The cash fund of the institution has been steadily increased in the last three years, the report showing \$2,822 in 1913; \$4,577 in 1914, and \$5,874 in 1915. Receipts from the sale of crops raised on the institution farm amounted to \$9,934 of which alfalfa brought in \$1,638; beets, \$2,884; hogs (167 head), \$1,123; and potatoes, \$1,647.

Fairbury News Notes. FAIRBURY, Neb., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Roy Riley has been circulating a petition around Fairbury asking to have the name of R. W. Sabin of Beatrice, put on the ballot as a candidate for district judge for the Eighteenth judicial district. According to figures compiled by the Fairbury postoffice force there was an increase in business of \$2,648 over 1914.
