

BROOKLYN MAN TO GET WELFARE JOB

T. F. Sturges and Rabbi Cohn Authorized by Commission to Engage a Superintendent.

K. L. SCHRIEBER FIRST CHOICE

T. F. Sturges and Rabbi Frederick Cohn, on behalf of the Welfare board, were authorized by the city council to enter into negotiations with K. L. Schrieber of Brooklyn, N. Y., with a view of engaging him for the position of superintendent of the board.

Mr. Schrieber was recommended by L. A. Halbert, general superintendent of the Kansas City Welfare board, the Brooklyn man having served six years at Kansas City. For six months Mr. Schrieber has been in child welfare work at Brooklyn and is said to be well equipped by training and experience for the Omaha position.

The new superintendent will be paid \$1,500 to \$1,800 a year. It is understood he will accept the Omaha proposition and will be here within a week or so to begin his work.

The welfare board will be given quarters in the balcony of the city council chamber, a space which has been used only once in the last three years.

Speaking to the city council, Mr. Sturges urged that it would be better to engage a man who is thoroughly experienced in the work and thus have the benefit of that experience right from the start.

GREAT PROCESSION FOLLOWS BODY OF BISHOP TO CHURCH

bishop. Rev. Father Stenson was master of ceremonies.

Black Candles Burn at Bier. During the prayers those of the uniformed lodgesmen who could crowd into the church knelt in the aisles. The edifice was heavily draped and large black candles burned beside the bier. A portion of the church was reserved for nuns and sisters of the convent.

At the conclusion of the short prayer service the lodgesmen filed past the casket for a last view of the departed bishop, the guard of honor was resumed and the general public formed in line to file past the casket.

For the remainder of the afternoon and all night the body lay in state and guards of honor from the various Catholic orders alternated in watching.

It is expected that the large church will be crowded early this morning by the hundreds who desire to attend the funeral. No sittings will be reserved, except a few for nuns and priests.

The Funeral Program.

The services will begin at 9:30 o'clock with the chanting of the divine office by a large number of Omaha and visiting priests. Pontifical requiem mass will then be celebrated by Archbishop James Keane of Dubuque, one of the three attending prelates of higher rank than the deceased bishop.

Rev. Rev. F. X. McMenamy, president and rector of Creighton university, will be the assistant in the mass. Rev. James Ahern of St. Agnes' parish and Rev. Pacificus Kohlen of St. Joseph's parish will be deacons of honor. Rev. Father McCarthy of St. Peter's church will be active deacon of the mass and Rev. Ferdinand Schnetzgen of Hartington will be sub-deacon. Masters of ceremonies will be Rev. James W. Stenson of St. Philomena's parish and Rev. Hugh Gately, who was secretary to the deceased bishop.

Other assistants in the mass will be: Rev. E. F. Flanagan, book bearer; Rev. M. A. Stagno, candle bearer; Rev. David Neiligan and Rev. W. Hallinan, acolytes; Rev. J. Borer, thurifer; Rev. M. Bronagusta, S. J., and Rev. Theobald Kalanowski, O. F. M., antiphonists.

Ireland to Preach Sermon.

Archbishop John Ireland of St. Paul, one of the foremost Catholic prelates in the United States, will arrive this morning and will preach the funeral sermon, following the pontifical mass.

Last absolutions will then be said by Bishop McGovern, Bishop Thien, Bishop Davis and Bishop Carrigan. Archbishop Keane will administer the final absolution at the close of the services.

Burial will be in Holy Sepulchre cemetery, the grave being in about the center of the priests' lot, near the graves of former Bishops O'Connor and O'Gorman.

Monsieur A. M. Colaneri will probably conduct the brief burial services, which consist of prayers and the incense ceremony, following the sprinkling of holy water and the use of incense. All the priests will attend and participate in the prayers.

Many Children View Body.

A touching feature at the bishop's yesterday while the body was still lying in state there was the presence of many children. They braved the bad weather to view the body for the last time, and reverently knelt in prayer at its side for a moment.

The body was clad in the purple robes of the high office of the deceased prelate had held in Omaha for a quarter of a century. At the four corners of the rich, bronze casket stood guards of honor from the fourth degree of the Knights of Columbus, who carried unheated swords pointing downward, and wore the black and purple mourning clothes and insignia befitting the solemn occasion.

Archbishop James Keane of Dubuque, metropolitan of the province of which the Omaha diocese is a part, arrived here Monday night and is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Louis C. Nash.

Monsignor Colaneri, who will administer the diocese until a bishop is appointed by Pope Benedict, has received many additional telegrams from prelates and priests, those who are able to come to the funeral stating that fact, and many others communicating their deep sorrow at the death of Bishop Scannell and explaining their inability to attend the funeral.

DR. C. IMPEY DIES FROM HEMORRHAGE

Veteran Omaha Physician Seized by Fatal Attack as He is About to Enter Hospital.

WAS SIXTY-THREE YEARS OLD

Dr. Charles Impey, veteran practicing physician and surgeon of Omaha, died yesterday afternoon at 5:30 from a hemorrhage of the brain.

Dr. Impey had just stepped from his automobile and was going up the walk to enter the Wise Memorial hospital when he was suddenly seized by the hemorrhage and he died almost instantly. The end was as unexpected as it was sudden. Dr. Impey was in the best of health a few moments before seized by the hemorrhage.

Dr. Impey was born in Savannah, Mo., sixty-three years ago. He was a graduate of the University of Louisville, Kentucky, where he earned his degree in medicine. He was a practicing physician and surgeon in Omaha since 1888.

He lived at 323 Pacific street and had an office with his son, Dr. C. C. Impey, in the Brandeis Theater building.

Dr. Impey is survived by his wife, one sister in Graham, Mo.; three sons, Dr. C. C. Impey and J. E. Impey of Omaha and C. F. Impey of Oakland, Cal., and two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Downey of Omaha and Mrs. E. H. Blackely of Oakland, Cal.

No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral.

Kitchener Tells How Eight German Subseas Were Lost

(Associated Press Correspondence.)

ATHENS, Dec. 26.—How eight German submarines that set out to attack the British great fleet were either destroyed or captured was described in a story told by Lord Kitchener on his recent visit here. No public account of the affair was ever given.

"When the maneuvers of the great fleet were held about a month ago north of Scotland," said Lord Kitchener, "eight German submarines were either destroyed or captured by the fleet and playing havoc with the maneuvers. One came to grief in our North Sea net. The others nosed through and approached the fleet. But there was another net heading them off. They tried to break through to get around to find an opening. But there was none. Two more were lost in this effort. Finally the remainder decided to return to their base at Heligoland.

"But they could no longer find the way out. The gate and the net had been closed. Two more were lost desperately trying to get through. The remaining three finally were forced to come to the surface and surrender themselves. We took them intact—crews, submarines and all."

Culled from the Wire.

The annual convention of the Western Retail Implement Vehicle and Hardware Dealers' association, held its first day's session at Kansas City. Four hundred delegates are present from Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Iowa and Nebraska.

Frederick Griselmeier was found guilty in the San Francisco superior court of having obtained money from Dr. Karl Muck, director of the Boston Symphony orchestra, under false pretenses. He was sentenced to eighteen months in San Quentin penitentiary.

The recent ruling of the Missouri public service commission, regarding the proposed plan of reorganizing the St. Louis & San Francisco (Frisco) railroad, was accepted at Jefferson City with one exception by representatives of the reorganization managers, under false pretenses. The exception is the "voting trust" feature.

Rufus Wilson of Seattle Commercial Club Gives Omaha Ad Men Advice on Publicity.

ADVERTISING WAY TO SUCCESS

"Don't be afraid to spend money in your local newspapers for advertising the possibilities and municipal institutions of your community," was a statement made by Rufus R. Wilson, chairman of the publicity committee of the Seattle Commercial club, in a talk at noon yesterday to the Omaha Ad club.

The visitor spoke on "Community Advertising" as one of the necessities of modern business life.

"To make your community development work successful," he said, "you first should know that your town is a desirable place to live and do business in, and you should have a sound reason for advertising, and then adopt a convincing manner of advertising your community to the world. You should be able to say with truth that your community is equal or superior to other communities. "A limited program is desirable. The

most successful communities today are doing one or two things at a time. I maintain that an expert should have charge of community development work. You should cultivate a friendly spirit with other communities, and do not overlook the community interest between the country and town. Development work must be intensive as well as extensive. The man on the ground should be looked after as well as the prospective newcomer. As a rule the man who seeks a bonus to locate in a community is a lame duck. Let him alone. "Don't get it into your head that community development is a one-man job. Team work is necessary if you expect to get anywhere. Your commissioner of the Commercial club and your publicity manager must have an army of enthusiastic boosters behind them. You must have the will to succeed." Mr. Wilson went into detail to illustrate how intent possibilities of various communities have been cultivated into strong life through earnest and intelligent community advertising.
