

NEW YORK, Jan. II.—Liquidation of speculative specialties, which had its inception last week on pithication of the Gary statement, gathered greater headway today, the movement receiving substantial assistance from a formidable short interest. Declines were most severe in the so-called war stocks, losses of three to seven points being sustained at their extreme declines by Crucible Steel, Pressed Steel Car, American Car, Baldwin Locomotive, Studebaker and Colorado Fuel.
