

ICE HARVEST IS ON; WORK FOR 1,000 MEN

Captain Kline Can Find Places for All Who Are Now Out of Employment.

NEED SOME WARM CLOTHES

Around Omaha the ice harvest was on in full blast Friday. It came a couple of days sooner than was expected. The far below zero temperature of the last three days has frozen the ice rapidly and now on most of the waters around the city, where the supply of ice is garnered, sheets ten to twelve inches in thickness cover the lakes and reservoirs.

Needs More Men.

Captain Kline can place 200 to 300 men with the Lakeside ice company at once. Their work will be on Carter lake. There is no boarding house there and the men who go to that place to work will have to make provisions for getting meals and lodging elsewhere.

The Omaha Ice and Cold Storage company, through Captain Kline yesterday gave employment to fifty men on its fields on the north side of Carter lake, clearing off the snow and marking the field. This company will be in the field for 150 or 250 men Saturday morning. At this field there is a large boarding house, where all of the men can get their meals and where a large number of them can sleep.

At the Keeline ice company's plant on Carter lake some forty men started marking the field yesterday and cutting will begin today, at which time employment will be given 200 to 300 men.

At Cotah's plant on Seymour lake about 100 men went to work on the ice yesterday and the force will be increased to probably 400 today.

Captain Kline asserts that when it comes to finding enough men to meet the demand at this time it is a difficult matter. There are not anything like as many idle men who want to work as it had been supposed that there was.

Then, too, a lot of men who apply for work are not strong enough to go to the ice fields and still others have not sufficient clothing. The ensign insists that every man must have an overcoat, heavy gloves, or mittens, cap and overboots. Many are not supplied with these articles and at Salvation Army headquarters there is a woeful shortage.

Needs Overcoats.

Right at this time if Captain Kline had 100 overcoats, that additional number of men could be given employment, men who without the coats, must remain idle.

All parties who want work on the ice must report to Captain Kline at Salvation Army headquarters, 1113 Dodge street. There, if they are properly clothed and are able bodied, they will be given identification cards and sent to the ice fields. These identification cards will assure jobs to the men who hold them.

Ellick dropped his overcoat and portfolio and was about to defend himself, when Attorney Ben Baker, for the plaintiff, interfered and stopped the fight. Ellick resumed trial of the case today.

Charles Mack Dies at Sixty-Four Years

Charles H. Mack, aged 64 years, died at his home, 1721 South Tenth street, early Friday morning after an illness of two years. He had been an employee of the Union Pacific for the last thirty-eight years in the capacity of brakeman and passenger and conductor, and in recent years, as car accountant in the general yard master's office. He was a member of Capitol lodge of the Masons, and was also a member of Union Pacific council, No. 105, of the Royal Arcanum. Funeral services will be announced later. He is survived by his widow and two children, Charles L. Mack of this city and Mrs. M. L. Jensen of Newman Grove.
