GRAND ISLAND BUSINESS MEN'S CLUBS MAY UNITE

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Jan. 19.-(Speciai,)-At the annual meeting of the Commercial club an important step was taken toward the unification of the business interests of the city in one organization.
