

Nebraska MANY CANDIDATES SUBMIT FILINGS

B. R. Barton Sends Acceptance of Petition in His Behalf for Congress.

BECKMANN FOR RE-ELECTION

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Secretary of State Poole's special filing will receive quite a grip today, the following making known their wants:

Harry Adams of Chadron filed as a moderate candidate for the nomination for state treasurer.

Thomas E. Conley of Fairbury filed for re-nomination on the republican ticket as representative from the Thirty-fourth district, composed of the counties of Gage, Thayer and Jefferson.

W. L. Minor of Lincoln filed for the republican nomination for state auditor.

Robert G. Ross of Lexington, who filed four years ago for the presidency, has again filed, but the secretary of state declined to accept the filing because the same was not in proper legal form and returned it to Mr. Ross.

GRAND ISLAND BUSINESS MEN'S CLUBS MAY UNITE

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—At the annual meeting of the Commercial club an important step was taken toward the unification of the business interests of the city in one organization.

The question of uniting the two has been under discussion for over a year and at this meeting the matter was referred to a committee of five appointed by the president of the Commercial club.

The Commercial club, 39 votes being cast, elected as directors for the ensuing two years P. W. Ashton, J. L. Cleary, E. L. Brown, Jack Donald, A. F. Buecher, J. D. Whitmore, C. E. Fuehrer, Julius Hoeck, C. H. Tully and David Kaufman.

A movement to put in a mile of permanent road separate from the Lincoln Highway effort is also on foot.

Nebraska Richards to Present Primary Law Case to Supreme Court

HURON, S. D., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—R. O. Richards left yesterday with his attorneys for Washington, D. C., to present the matter of the South Dakota primary election law to the United States supreme court.

Before leaving, Mr. Richards said: "It is now no longer a matter of the Richards primary law, but the greater question of the people's right to rule, and a question of the integrity of the constitutional amendment on the initiative and referendum; also of the integrity of the election laws of the state as expressed by the majority of the people at the polls."

"I have no idea whether the United States supreme court will grant any relief, but we will exhaust all legal remedies first, and then appeal to the people through the republican proposal promulgated at Pierre, January 3."

ELGIN COMMUNITY CLUB WILL HAVE BUILDING

ELGIN, Neb., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The most enthusiastic meeting ever held in Elgin for the consideration of public matters was held in the Odd Fellow's hall, when the members of the Elgin Community club met to consider the report of a special committee to investigate the matter of a club building.
