clock on the stage of the Auditorium. The machinery running in demonstration work at the implement show, which is held in connection with the convention, occupying all the floor space and the basement, was temporarily shut off for the session of the convention.

### Know Your Neighbor.

The reports of the secretary and treasurer followed President Lehmkuhl's address. T. N. Witten of Trenton, Mo., then followed with his talk on "The Trenton Idea and Its Possibilities." Mr. Witten's slogan is, "Get acquainted with your neighbor—you might like him."

He pushed this slogan into action to such an extent at Trenton, Mo., as president of the Commercial club there that he got the farmers for miles around to join the club and established there the principle that the club is not for the good of the business man in the city alone, but must, to be a real success from a community standpoint, be of benefit to the entire community, producers, transporters, jobbers, manufacturers, retailers and consumers. Mr. Witten gives the interesting case of Lincoln, Neb., in which this idea has been followed out with considerable success to such an extent that hundreds of farmers have the privilege of the club rooms now at a reasonable cost, and are getting their lunches there when they come to Lincoln. At the same time these farmer members of the Lincoln club are calling up the club every morning for market reports and are getting the reports there from every quarter of the globe.

### Moving Pictures.

Moving pictures of some phases of the big tractor show held at Fremont last August are to be shown at the Auditorium at 7, 8 and 9 each day. They are being shown under the auspices of the Twentieth Century Farmer, which is the company that staged the big tractor show at Fremont last summer and hired a moving picture photographer to go to Fremont and make some elaborate films. The last day of the tractor show a special feature was staged with the tractors apparently just pulling into town from a long run, the lead tractor being driven by Miss Laura Wols of Fremont, daughter of Senator Wols of that place.

### Banquet Tonight.

Last evening the manufacturers and jobbers in the implement business held a big banquet at the Fontenelle hotel. This evening a big reception and entertainment is to be given all the implement men at the Commercial club rooms, compliments of the Commercial club.

Every foot of floor space in the Auditorium is taken with booths for the exhibit of implements of various kinds at the implement show. The basement is occupied with the tractors. There is a constant buzz and rattle of machinery in action, for every machine in the house that has a wheel must demonstrate. Corn planters are clicking, gasoline engines are coughing, saw separators are moaning and harvesters are clanking their chains. Although the convention was not called until after 9 o'clock there was an exceptionally good crowd out for the implement show as soon as the doors opened this morning.

The association is making a campaign for membership. Secretary Wallace says he expects the membership to be ma-

terially increased before the convention and the show is over this year. No admission charge is made to the show.

## This Tractor is for Average Size Farm

The Allis-Chalmers 10-15 farm tractor is one of the interesting exhibits at the implement dealers' convention. This machine is intended to serve the man who owns an average size farm and do all the work he has been doing with horses.

It is easy to operate, of light weight but rugged construction, and built of the best material.

The Allis-Chalmers has two drive wheels and one steering wheel. A differential provides for steering either to the right or the left. The steering wheel is in line with one of the drive wheels, and these wheels may, therefore, run in one of the furrows which steers the tractor automatically when plowing.

The motor is two-cylinder horizontal type, built for heavy duty. The frame is a single steel casting with machined surfaces, and holes for bearings. The weight of the tractor is 4,500 pounds.

The speed is two and one-third miles per hour.
