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RAISE CASH FOR UNIVERSITY

Alumni of Omaha Institution Makes Pledges to Open New Campaign.

COUNTY FARM MAY BE ITS SITE

Plans to raise a permanent endowment fund for the University of Omaha were set on foot by the alumni of that school at their annual banquet Friday evening at the Henshaw. Plans were announced in accordance with which the alumni would pledge \$100 each, to be paid at the rate of \$10 a year. The alumni also decided to elect a committee to study the situation as possible.

Whether or not the county poor farm site is secured, a new location will have to be had soon as the present buildings are nearly filled to capacity. The growth in the last three years has been over 100 per cent each year, and the next enrollment will tax Redick and John Jacobs Memorial halls to their utmost.

There is no doubt of the need of a university in Omaha, said Dr. D. E. Jenkins, president of the school and a member of the Board of Education.
