ALLIES ADVANCING IN FRANCE

BERLIN, June 14 .- (Via London.) - Official announcement was made here this afternoon that General Von Mackenzen has occupied the Russian positions along the entire front in the eastern arena of the fighting from Cyerniawa to Sienawa,

LONDON, June 14 .- Although the French would appear to be unrelenting in their offensive work, which is Austro-Germans are straining every nerve to deliver a crushing blow to the Russians, remains of the utmost importance. No confirmation has yet been received of the report that the Austro-Germans have reoccupied Zurawna, but further to the south they are across the river Dneister and on Russian soil in Bessarabia.

Activity on Eastern Front. frontier. The stand which the Russians have been making recently in Galicia Indicates to British observers that their shortage of ammunition has been overcome. It was this shortage, according to the belief here, that enabled the Austro-Germans last month to sweep across the country and take Przemysl in such record sime.
