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

Tien Lan Lin, '14, the first Chinese student to graduate from Southwestern college. Winfield, Kan., has been chosen leader of the Princeton Chinese debating team, which meets the Harvard Chinese tteam next September. The ouestion is, Resolved, That China should adopt onscription." 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
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
