MORRIS HEADS NORMAL BOARD

Elected President After the Pins Had Been Set to Land Vile of Norfolk in the Position.

MAJORS IS VICE PRESIDENT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, June 23.—(Special Telegram.)—A cog slipped in the meeting of the State Normal board late this afternoon, and as a result Dan Morris of Kearney was elected president of the board, notwithstanding there was every indication that the pins had been set for the reelection of A. H. Vile of Norfolk.

MEDICAL AID FOR EMPLOYE

Labor Commissioner Coffey Makes Ruling on Compensation Law in This Respect.

BOTH HAVE SOMETHING TO SAY

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, June 23.—(Special.)—The Dempster Mill company of Beatrice has asked Labor Commissioner Frank Coffey to make a ruling as to who has the right to employ a doctor in case of injury, the employer or the employee. The question is asked:

If we offer to send a man to a first-class hospital and give a first-class doctor and his services to accept this offer, and this hospital and doctor to hire a doctor and hospital other than the one we wish him to have, are we responsible for his hospital and doctor bills, and is he entitled to compensation while he is off?

Right of Employer. Section 3675 provides that the employer may request or demand that the injured employee submit to an examination during the term of his incapacitation, and the employer may have a doctor of his own selection make the examination, the employer to pay the expense.

Theory of the Laws. The theory upon which compensation laws are enacted is that when the contract of employment is entered into that there shall also be an agreement as to how much money and hospital and medical services the injured employee shall be entitled to in case of personal injury, or if an injury resulting in disability, how much money the dependents of the injured employee shall receive.

Intent of Legislature. As we interpret the intent of the legislature as written into the compensation law, the right of selection of the medical and hospital services and medicines in the first instance does not rest solely with the employer.

News Notes of Columbus. COLUMBUS, Neb., June 23.—(Special.)—The case of Wurdeman against the city of Columbus is being tried in the district court, Judges Butten and Thomas presiding. Some time ago the city received bids for paving the streets, and accepted the bitulith process, which is now strongly opposed by the brick people on the ground that the contract is illegal for want of proper bids.

North Platte Man Drops Dead. NORTH PLATTE, Neb., June 23.—(Special.)—William Siebold, aged 58, suddenly pitched forward at his farm Monday afternoon and died shortly afterward. Heart failure is thought to have caused death. Mr. Siebold leaves a widow and nine children. The funeral services are to be held Thursday afternoon from the home, twelve miles northwest of this city. Rev. J. C. Christie of this city will be in charge.

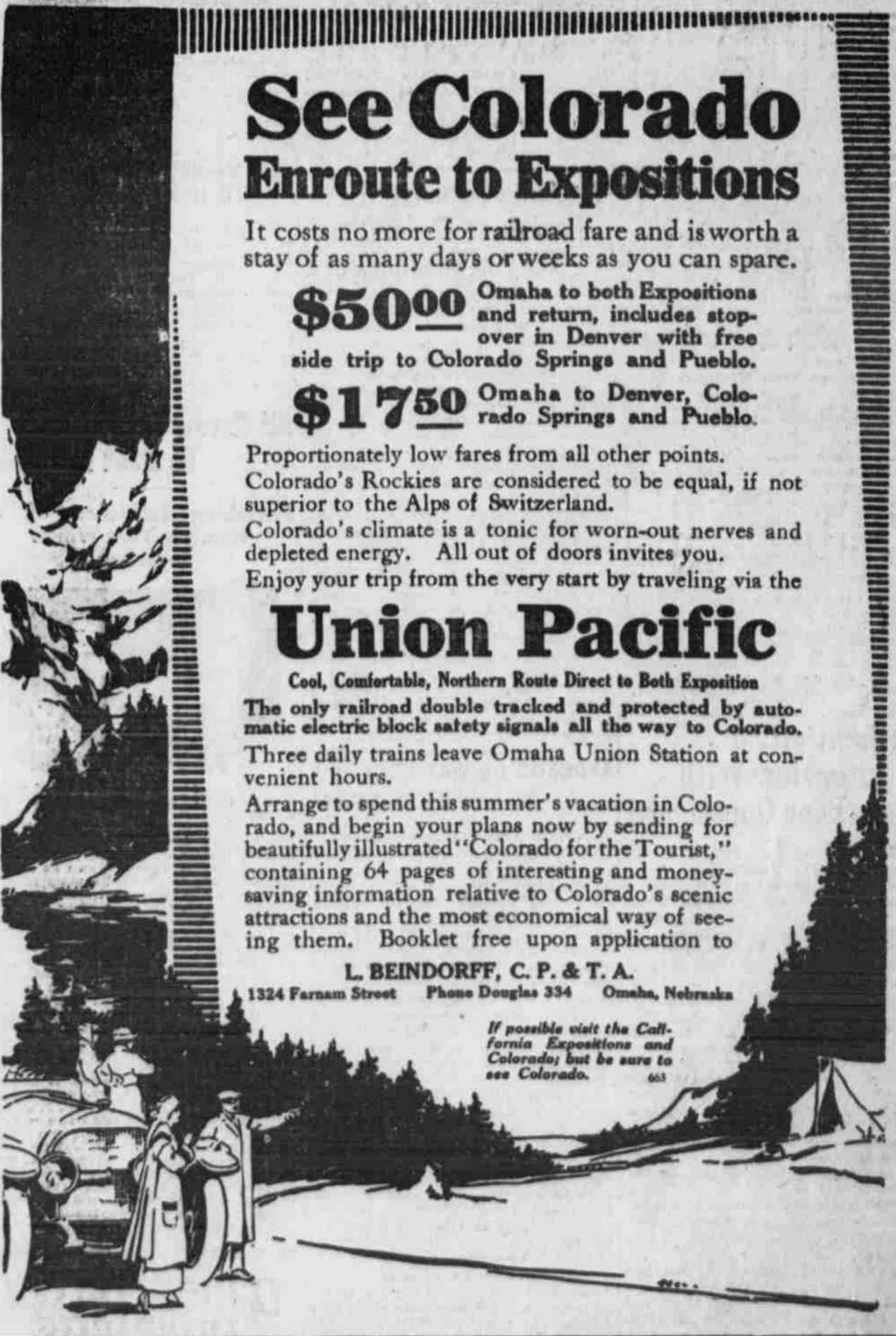
