On his way to England to do religious and social work among German prisoners interned there, State Secretary J. E. Spruger of the California Young Men's Christian association passed through Omaha Wednesday evening on the Overland Limited.

He is a German-Swiss by birth and talks German fluently, although he is now an American citizen. His work among the German prisoners will be under the auspices of the national council of Young Men's Christian associations of Great Britain. Denton of the Omaha association, who is going to do association work among foreign soldiers in India, who passed through Omaha on Wednesday on his way east to take ship for Cairo, Egypt. American Girl in Zeppelin Raid in England Tells of Her Experience

NEW YORK, June 24.—Miss Clara Reis, 15 years old, who for two years has been a student at Somerset House, a finishing school at Ramsgate, England, returned to her home in this city aboard the New York, and described her experiences during the bombardment of the town by the dreaded Zeppelins.

Arrangements had been made by her father, Benedict Reis, to have Clara come in January, but when the Germans declared a war zone around England, he decided to allow her to remain at the school. But the overhead attacks changed the plans and Clara sailed from Liverpool on June 12.

"I was the only American girl in the school," she said. "There was a 5-year-old girl there, but she was taken away some time ago. After the Zeppelins began to make their route over Ramsgate, the teachers of the school hung an enormous bell in the main hall, outside the dormitories. We were drilled when the bell rang to get out of bed, dress and go to another dormitory, where the girls from 1 year to 7 years sleep and help dress them. Then we were all to march out of the building when the danger became great.

"Life was not very exciting at Somerset House, so these drills were a kind of a party for us. So was the bombardment by the Zeppelins. We had candy to eat, and fought pillow fights, and got fun out of it. It was exciting to be called out of bed at all hours of the night, and we got used to it.

"At 2 o'clock on March 17 the big bell woke us up, so we got out of bed and dressed. At the same time the sirens in the town began to blow and we knew it was no drill. There was firing outside. Soldiers were rushing about. "We peeped out the windows and saw three or four Zeppelins flying low. We heard the noise of their engines and it gave us a creepy feeling. Then they struck houses and killed two persons. The warships in the harbor were firing at the Zeppelins. "We were not frightened. It was only

exciting. Two nights later the Zeppelins came again and dropped bombs into the cemetery, burning some houses. The big bell rang again and we went through the same drill."

GREAT SHOWING IS EXPECTED

Over fifty cash prizes will be awarded to boys and girls having the best exhibits of early vegetables grown in the contests among members of the school garden clubs. The exhibit will be held next Monday at the Young Men's Christian association, under the direction of Ernest E. Dale, supervisor of the clubs and agent of the Department of Agriculture.

Prizes will be given on radishes, lettuce, onions, beans, peas, beets, turnips and spinach. In each group \$1 will be given as first prize, 20 cents as second prize and 25 cents each to the four next best. Twice those amounts will also be given as prizes for the best group exhibits of at least four different kinds of vegetables.

Several hundred boys and girls are planning to exhibit the products of their garden work.
