Barton Home Sold to H. S. Clarke, Banker, for His Residence

The handsome Guy C. Barton residence on West Farnam street, which passed on ter, Mrs. Christiancy, has just been purchased by Harry S. Clarke of the Corn Exchange National bank. This is probably the most expensive home ever erected in Omaha, occupying a quarter of a square, 148x205 feet, at Farnam and Thirty-fifth avenue. It was originally built by John H. Withnell, who in turn disposed of it to John H. Evans, from whom Mr. Barton bought it at the price of \$55,000. He put many thousands of dollars into remodelling and redecovating it and added a garage at a cost of \$40,000. He continued to occupy it as his town house until his death, after which it was occupied for a short time by the family of his son, King Charles Barton. It has been vacant since the latter's death.

Though the present sale price is not given out it is reported that it is considerably less than what Mr. Barton originally paid for it. The Clarkes, who are now residing at 124 South Thirty-ninth street, do not expect to move into their new home until fall.




