Shares Are Less Reactionary at Session Than Previously.

COMFORTING NEWS FROM BERLIN

NEW YORK, June 35.—Stocks were less reactionary today, traders extracting some comfort from foreign advices that the forthcoming German note will go a long way toward meeting the American government's wishes regarding Germanny's conduct of submarine warfare. Nevertheless, there was more European selling of American securities and further private offerings of our short term motes.

Coincidentally, foreign exchange continued to move against the French capital, checks on Paris making the new record of 5.5e mainly as a result of an utter lack of inquiry for these remitiances. This situation was the more puzzling, inasmuch as the new French loan by American bankers was expected to effect at least a temporary readjustment of rates on Paris.

On the other hand, sterling exchange continued to harden, demand bills rising to 4.77%, against yesterday's low rate of 4.70%; while cables advanced a pemy on the round to 4.75%. The advance reflected increased buying of London bills, commercial and financial, to meet recent British sales of our stocks.

Specific movements in the stock market included additional heavy sales of United States Rubber at a further decline of two points. a total of twelve points since

States Rubber at a further decline of two points, a total of twelve points since Tuesday. Later the stock railled feebly but was inactive on the recovery. Canadian Pacific was again under pressure, but failed to repeal its low price.

The southwestern group of railways, which embraces the Missouri Pacific, Rock Island and Missouri, Kansas & Texas, developed sudden weakness on rumors affecting their financial rehabilitation, together with unfavorable crop news.

Although July dividend payments will not equal last year's by approximately 4.700,000, it is a hopeful sign that of late several corporate interests have announced increased disbursements, two railroads operating in the middle west being included in the list this week.

It seems assured that the nation's excess of exports over imports for the fiscal year will amount to a round billion dollars and while less gold has complere this week, France has arranged for a large loan. The proceeds of this will be used to finance purchases of war supplies in this country and so urgent have the foreign demands become that the iron and steel plants are steadily adding to productive capacity.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET LOWER PRICES FOR LAMB CHOPS RULE

Beef is Also Cheaper, but Pork is Higher-Fresh Vegetables Are Plentiful.

EGGPLANTS NEW ON MARKET

Lambs have dropped another dollar a hundred in the last week. There has been a persistent drop in the lamb market for several weeks. To the lovers of lamb clops this is a welcome drop, for lambs had gone so high as to be all but prohibitive. Western lambs are beginning to crowd on the market now, with the reguit that a steady drop is in progress. Lamb chops are a quarter a pound. Hind quarters are 1714 cents. Forequarters are 12% cents.

Beef has made a little drop also, so much that round steaks that cost 20 cents a week ago are now selling at 17% cents, and pot roasts that cost 12% cents a week ago are now costing 11% cents.

Pork Chops Higher. Pork chops have risen from 15 cents last week to 17% cents now. Leaf lard is 10 cents a pound. Hams and bacon are steady.

Flour is a little firmer again after a successive drop over a period of several weeks. It is not coming up perceptibly yet, but at the same time it is showing a tendency to stiffen up. It can still be had in the retail houses at \$1.5001.65 a sack of forty-eight pounds. Sugar is stiff, but is still selling at retail sixteen pounds for a dollar.

Benna Still High. Beans have retained their exorbitantly high mark since a few months after the war started. They then climbed steadily to \$3.50 a bushel, or 6 cents a pount, and

are still hanging at that figure. Figg plants are new on the market at 13% cen s each. Home grown peas are abundant at 55 cents a market basket, or 14 cents a quart.

Raspberries and blackberries, red and black, and of several varieties, are on the market reasonably cheap, while strawberries are practically over. Logan-berries can be had at 10 cents a box. Peaches are on the market in four-basket crates at 25 cents. Cantaloupes that sold at 7½ cents aplece last week are now a nickel. Apricots are \$1.25 a crate. They can be had at 35 cents a basket. This is said to be about as cheap as they will set and the canning season for them

Oranges Scarce. Oranges have gone up la cents a dozen and are scarce.

Butter is a half cent higher and cheese ndvanced 2 cents during the week. Al King, manager of Hayden Bros." grocery department, has arranged for a raisin day Saturday of this week in his grocery department. The famous Sun Maid raisins in fifteen-ounce packages will be especially exhibited, and arrangements have been made whereby a 18-cent loaf of raisin bread baked by the New Ergland bakery will be given free with every 25-cent order of raisins.
