SHOTS STARING WAR FIRED A YEAR AGO

Anniversary of Masder of Austrian Royal Pair, Resulting in Ten Nations Flying to Arms.

FIVE HUNDRED SHIPS SEA COST

A year ago yesterday the Austrian archduke, Francis Ferdinand, and his wife were shot and killed in the little Bosnian town of Sarajevo by Gavrilo Prinsip. It was the act of Prinsip, a poor student, which ultimately resulted in ten nations going to war. These nations are, on one hand, Great Britain, France, Russia, Serbia, Japan, Belgium, Italy and Montenegro, and, on the other, Germany, Austria and Turkey. The war to date, according to conservative estimates compiled from the best available reports, has caused a loss to the various belligerents of more than 6,000,000 men, dead, wounded and prisoners, and more than 500 ships. Of these about 120 were war vessels.

China and Japan Warned

United States in Identical Notes Tells Them Door Must Be Kept Open.

WILL INSIST ON TREATY RIGHTS

BEIJING, June 28.—Warning that the United States would not recognize any agreement between China and Japan which impaired American rights in China or endangered the so-called "open door" policy, was conveyed to the government of both China and Japan in an identical note from Washington, which was delivered about May 27. The notes were handed to the foreign offices of both countries a week after China had acceded to the demands contained in the Japanese ultimatum, insisting upon concessions from the former nation. The United States note in substance follows: "In view of the negotiations which now are pending between the government of China and the government of Japan and of the agreements which have been reached as a result thereof, the government of the United States has the honor to notify the government of the Chinese republic that it cannot recognize any agreement or undertaking which has entered into or which may be entered into, between the governments of China and Japan impairing the treaty rights of the United States and its citizens in China, the political or territorial integrity of the republic of China, or the international policy relative to China commonly known as the open door policy. An identical note has been transmitted to the Japanese government."

THIRTY THOUSAND FIRE AT ATLANTIC

ATLANTIC, Ia., June 28.—(Special Telegram.)—A \$30,000 fire at 2 o'clock this morning destroyed the Mickel frame elevator building and another building just south of it, damaged four Rock Island freight cars and burned several local sheds filled with coal belonging to local dealers. The Mickel elevator building, in which the fire started, was fitted up in the front part by W. Siby for a restaurant.

YAQUIS STRIP 300 OF THEIR CLOTHING

Indians Leave Every Person in Mining Town Naked and Carry Four Girls Away.

THEY GO BURDENED WITH LOOT

GUAYMAS, Mexico, June 28.—(By Radio to San Diego, Cal.)—Advises received here by messenger from the interior state that 200 Yaqui Indians raided the mining town of Sauze, 100 miles inland from Guaymas, assembled 300 inhabitants and stripped every one naked, then, while a detail guarded them, others looted the town, packing up everything transportable on a pack train. When the raiders departed they took with them four young girls. No casualties are reported. Come with Bugles and Drums. The Indians approached the town mounted, with bugles flourishing and drums rattling. The inhabitants assumed they were a body of troops approaching to protect them and offered no resistance. Captain Ashley Robertson of the United States cruiser Colorado and Major William N. McKelvey of the marine corps, accompanied by three other officers, motored through the American settlement in the Yaqui valley today to investigate conditions. They found everything quiet. The settlers have built barricades of bags of grain around their houses and all houses are loopholed. Mexican troops now garrison all the farms in the valley and no further raids are expected, as the rains have set in. The settlers all express the intention to remain and fight the Indians if necessary. Order of Maytorena. It is reported that General Maytorena has ordered his troops not to take the offensive against the Indians. The authorities at Mazatlan, it is said, detained a commission from Lower California, a neutral faction, who were urging peace, until they announced allegiance to Carranza. The military commandant at Lapes has placed all civil officers of the neutral government under arrest, awaiting the arrival of the Carranza gunboat Guerrero.

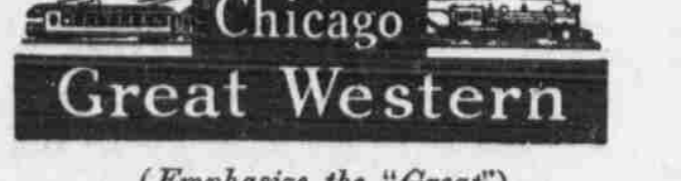

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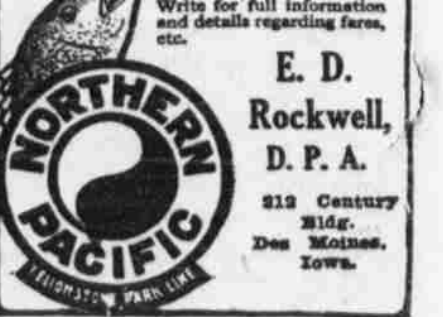
