UNCLE SAM MAKES BIG TAX HAUL HERE

Wednesday, Last Day of the Fiscal Year, Breaks All Records, with but One Exception.

BIG GAIN MADE ON THE YEAR

All records of the local internal revenue office for a day's collections, with one exception, were broken Wednesday when the receipts of the office were \$67,565.01.

This big collection was due to the fact that there are more varieties of taxes to be paid this year than for some time and also to the fact that Wednesday was the last day of the fiscal year, and those who had put off as long as possible paying their money goodbye made final payment of it into Uncle Sam's coffers. The one day that showed bigger col-

lections than this was in 1904, when the government tax on spirits was increased from 90 cents to \$1.30. Collections on that day were \$190,000.

Total collections of this office for the fiscal year, which ended Wednesday, amounted to \$2,578,363.06. This was an increase of \$17,167.91 over the total collections during the preceding year.

Collections during the month of June were \$401,670.22.

Although the number of persons paying income tax into this office is practically the same as last year, the amount paid in is almost double that of the preceding year. This is due partly, says Acting Collector North, to the fact that in the first year of the income tax's operation, dividends were not required to be figured in estimating a person's income.

Approximately 3,300 persons pay income tax through this office.

Congress having amended the income tax law so that persons can withhold payment until July 10 without suffering penalty, a considerable amount of this money has not yet been paid in.

Receipts of the office for the year have exceeded the estimates of Mr. North.
