A similar forecast in regard to Indiana counted further against the buils. In addition, prospects were said to be flattering for a big yield in the spring crop beit. Announcements were made, too, that a Baltimore exporter was cancelling purchases, and that as much as 250,000 bushels had been resold for his account. Reductions in premiums for cash wheat were so sharp as to attract considerable attention. As compared with the July prices, the rate for No. 2 hard was fully so lower than yesterday. Transactions in No. 3 red equally demonstrated that recent fear of a threatened shortage in supplies here had to a great extent already faded away.

Favorable weathe rand crop reports tended to ease off the corn market. Some notice was taken also of the chance of a surplus this season in the southern states.
