SUIT FOR DAMAGES BEGUN

Threatened Action Against City of Des Moines Over Bridge Patents is Begun.

TESTS MOTTED MATTER IN COURT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., July 16.—(Special Telegram.)—The threatened suit against Des Moines for alleged infringement of the Thatcher bridge patents materialized today when papers were filed in federal court.

Liquor Law Violation Charged. In an information filed in justice court yesterday by County Attorney Wilson, the Chicago & Northwestern railway is charged with violation of the liquor law enacted by the thirty-sixth general assembly, which requires that a record book of liquor shipments shall be kept by station agents throughout Iowa.

City in Bridge Patent Suit. P. H. Drury, attorney for the Thatcher bridge patent interests, who has brought suit against Polk county charging violation of the Thatcher patents in the construction of bridges, will also bring suit against the city of Des Moines. He expects to file his papers at 10 o'clock and will probably file his papers at that time.

Code Editor Discharged. Continued delay on the part of Charles S. Wilcox, state code editor, in getting out the code index, has resulted in his being discharged from his position by the members of the supreme court. He was appointed by the code commission two years ago to take charge of the work of getting out the code supplement, which was to be completed by October 1, 1914.

Carlson Gets a Job. Tom Carlson, veteran Texas league catcher, recently released by the Beaumont club, has signed a contract with the Galveston Pirates.

(the supplement of 1914 resulted in his being discharged by the court. U. G. Whitney was given the work of preparing the text of the supplement of 1915 and this work was completed, but has never been bound because the index was not ready. Consequently the attorneys over the state have been unable to secure any official copies of the laws as published by the last general assembly. A temporary index will be prepared and the 1915 supplement issued with it separately in order that the public may be advised what the laws are.)

Loss Positions Through Law. The provisions of the new child labor law which limit the hours of labor of persons under 18 years to eight hours per day or forty-eight hours per week is resulting in many young people losing their positions with department stores, factories and other large employers.

Minneapolis Firm Gets Contract. The State Board of Control yesterday let the contract for thirteen buildings for the state epileptic colony at Woodward to the Bailey Marsh company of Minneapolis for \$230,000. Ten of the buildings constitute the hospital group and the other three are the power house, service building and laundry.

Auto Plate Contract Let. The executive council has awarded the contract for 200,000 auto plates, eighteenth issue, to the Borens Manufacturing company of St. Paul, at 5 1/2 cents per pair. Last year the same firm secured the contract at 23 cents per pair, but this year's plates are heavier, owing to the fact that the new law provides they can be used for three years.

Confiscate Wheat Crop to Avoid High Prices in Austria

(Correspondence of Associated Press.) VIENNA, July 15.—Although Austria has no fear of an insufficient harvest, and although conditions even now are improving to such an extent that the notably bad bread is being rapidly bettered, plans are already being considered for confiscating the 1915 harvest of wheat of various kinds to avoid high prices superinduced by speculation.

It is proposed to create, from the present war flour control commission, a state organization, into whose hands the entire confiscated crop would be delivered, and whose members would divide the flour evenly and equably. The farmers are not at all averse to the confiscation of the crop and the establishment of a uniform price for their product, but they oppose the central organization plan, and prefer that the flour pass into the control of the district commissions. It is only the members of the produce associations and business who oppose the confiscation and uniform price idea.

Even though maximum prices were established by the government this year, they have been disregarded by the speculators, who have paid 60 kroner for flour that was supposed to sell for 45. How the speculation has worked out is shown in the case of lentils and beans which has had no maximum price, and which

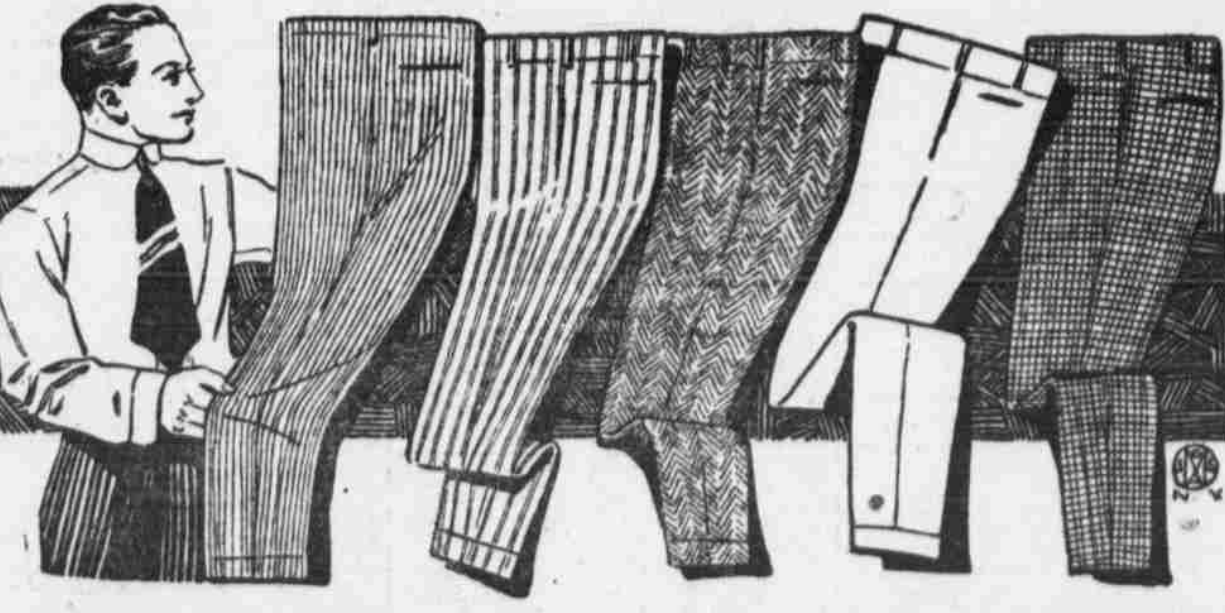
