

FEW MACHINISTS AT BRIDGEPORT STRIKE

Men Employed by Subcontractors Quit Work at Noon—Main Plant Not Affected, Says Company.

RUMORS OF CONCESSIONS TO MEN

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 20.—While labor leaders announced today that approximately 1,600 machinists employed in the shops of the Remington Arms and Ammunition company and four subcontractors had walked out on strike, indications were that difficulty in accomplishing the aim of the union men had been experienced in some of the plants.

An official of the Remington company denied emphatically that any of the men in that plant had walked out.

Rumors had it that Major W. G. Penfield had offered the machinists an eight hour day with other concessions and that they had decided to remain. Sub-contractors on the other hand, admitted that all of their machinists had walked out.

Among the sub-contracting firms admitting that their men had struck were the Gaylor Manufacturing company, making bullets for the armies of the allies, and the Columbia Nut and Bolt company. These concerns employ between them less than 300 men.

Attempt at Settlement.

Efforts to settle the complicated labor troubles at the plant have failed. Neither Samuel Gompers nor the president of the United States can stop this strike now, said J. J. Keppler, international vice president of the machinists' union. Mr. Gompers, as head of the American Federation of Labor, has called a conference of machinists officials at Washington, but those in charge of the situation here assert they will not heed the call.

Within a week, according to plans of labor leaders, all work in the Remington shops and in the factories of subcontractors will be at a standstill. There are 8,000 to 10,000 persons employed by the Remington company and it is estimated that including other local factories 20,000 or more would be thrown out of work.

Other Strike Calls Issued.

In addition to the new plant of the Remington Arms & Ammunition Co., strike calls today were issued for the machinists working in the Bridgeport Engineering company, the Columbia Nut & Bolt Co. and the Gaylor Manufacturing company. Less than 1,600 machinists are employed in the three last named plants.

At the Bridgeport Engineering company the men demanded that they be given the strike call because they were dissatisfied with working conditions. The call was issued for the Columbia Nut and Bolt company, J. J. Keppler, international vice president of the Machinists' union said, because of a statement attributed to Fred Atwater, treasurer of the company, which quoted him as saying, "The more hours they work and the less money they receive the better off they are. They will not have time to hang around saloons."

The Gaylor Manufacturing company is engaged in making rifle bullets for Great Britain and its allies. When announcement was made that the men in these three plants would walk out all was in readiness for the beginning of the strike at the Remington plant.

A militiaman here said today that a quantity of riot ammunition had been received at a local armory late last night. The militia, he said, had been instructed to be ready. This information could not be confirmed this forenoon. Additional policemen were stationed in various parts of the city.

Fifth Plant Affected.

Later it was announced that a strike call also would be issued for the Bullard Machine Tool company, where thirty-five men were discharged last week. It was said that only a few machinists were working at the Bullard plant now. Advertisements for machinists have appeared, however.

It was said at the headquarters of the Bricklayers' union here today that 100 men who had been working on new buildings being erected for the Remington company by the Stewart Construction company did not go to work today. They were informed last night that because of lack of work they were not needed. All the bricklayers on the new plant, it was said, would have to stop work within the next few days.

Agitators today were going among the great number of Hungarian workers of Bridgeport, urging them to attend a strike mass meeting called for tonight. More copies of a Hungarian newspaper, containing articles advocating the walk-out of the Hungarian workers in the plants of the Remington Arms and Ammunition company and various plants of the sub-contractors, were circulated.

Welsh Coal Miners' Strike Ends Thursday

LONDON, July 20.—The South Wales coal strike has been settled. An agreement to end it was reached today.

LONDON, July 20.—The strike of miners in the South Wales coal field this afternoon is regarded as a virtual end. It is expected the miners will be back at work on Thursday.

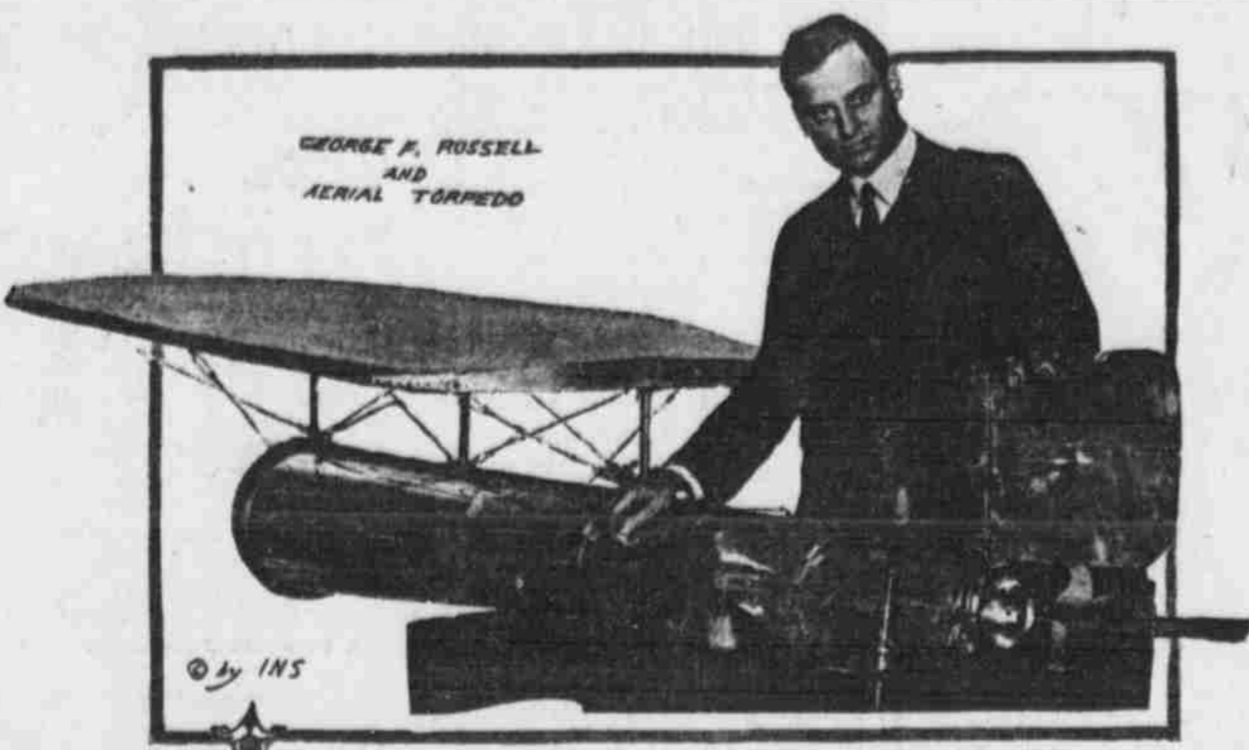

CARRANZA FORCES TAKE THREE TOWNS

Large Strip of Northern Sonora is Now in Hands of Constitutional Chieftain.

VILLA DEFEATED IN BATTLE

DOUGLAS, ARIZ., July 20.—Nacozari, Cupmas and Pilaros, three important towns of the Moctezuma district of Sonora, have been occupied by Carranza troops, according to reports received at Agua Prieta today. This gives the Carranza forces under General P. Filas Calles control of a strip of country 150 miles long, including seventy miles of the Nacozari railroad, which was being prepared to handle shipments of concentrates from Nacozari, El Tigre and other mining camps.

General Calles himself had today news of another victory over Villa forces at Villa Verde, notified his representatives here that he would continue on to Nogales, headquarters of Jose Mayforena, Villa governor, and in sleep to that place, which lies on the American border. The battle at Villa Verde occurred yesterday and Calles' message stated that the Villa forces retreated toward Nogales after three hours' fighting. The Villa losses were given as fifty-five killed and seventy prisoners. Calles also claimed to have captured two pieces of artillery, 25 rifles and a military train loaded with provisions and ammunition.

News of the victory was telegraphed to General Carranza at Vera Cruz. Calles' representatives here said their chief planned to occupy Cananea, where large American mining interests are centered, before next Sunday. In the meantime he hopes to drive Mayforena out of Nogales. He will then have control of the chief Sonora border points, Agua Prieta, Naco and Nogales.

Large Shipments of Bullion. GALVESTON, Tex., July 20.—Gold and silver bars to the value of \$30,000,000 reached Vera Cruz yesterday from the mines at Patzcuaro under military escort, according to information reaching the constitutionalists here today. The shipment is the property of foreign mining companies and will be taken to New York.

The report adds that the large quantities of food entering the capital are being distributed. The Carranza government is accepting all kinds of paper money in payment of food from the poorer classes.

There were no news of military operations in today's dispatches. LAREDO, Tex., July 20.—Tampico advices today confirmed the taking of San Luis Potosi by Carranza forces under General Novea. Some fighting occurred, but there was no heavy loss of life before the city was evacuated by the Villa troops. A large smelting company sent eighteen carloads of bullion into the United States here today, making a total of forty-two cars this week.

RUSS PROBABLY WILL ABANDON WARSAW SOON

Pursuing the enemy, who was defeated on the An river at Altuz, our troops yesterday reached the district of Hofzenberge and northwest of Mitau, where the enemy occupied previously prepared positions.

"East of Popelany and Kurssany the fighting continues. Between the Pissa and the Skwa, the Russians evacuated a position which had been penetrated at several points by our troops and are retreating toward the Narow. The German reserve landwehr fighting on this district of woody and marshy ground, which was extremely favorable to the resistance of the enemy, accomplished notable deeds.

"The army of General Von Gallwitz, advancing further, now is standing all its troops on the Narow line southwest of Ostrolenka and Nowo-Georgievsk. (Nowo-Georgievsk is a strong fortress about ten miles northwest of Warsaw, at the confluence of the Vistula and the Bug). The Hungarians, who did not find protection in their fortifications and bridgehead positions, already have retreated across the Narow (the Narow joins the Bug at Serock, eighteen miles north of Warsaw). The numbers of prisoners taken by us has been increased to 30 officers and 3,170 men.

"In Poland, between the Vistula and the Picia, the Russians are retreating eastward.

Russians Defeated at Cieplow. "The enemy, defeated on the Irb by the army under General Von Woytowicz southwest of Sianno, attempted to arrest our pursuit in his previously prepared positions behind the Iiaska sector. Yesterday afternoon the Russian landwehr

Woman May Enjoin Sunday Tabernacle

The location of the "Billy" Sunday tabernacle within the fire limits where wooden structures are prohibited has raised another obstacle to his Omaha engagement.

The city council placed on file without action a protest from Margaret A. Henry, owner of Lord Lester hospital, who complains that the Billy Sunday tabernacle being erected at Fourteenth street and Capitol avenue will be a fire hazard on account of its frame construction. The council already granted a permit for this structure.

A reading of the protest indicates that an attempt to erect the tabernacle on the strength of the alleged special permit from the council, which is characterized as a violation of the law, will be followed up by Mrs. Henry with an application for an injunction.
