TWO DAYS MORE OF SAENGERFEST

Splendid Parade Saturday Morning Leads to German Home for Delegates' Convention.

BIG PICNIC TO BE HELD SUNDAY

Omaha's most successful saengerfest did not close after the concert last evening, but instead the visiting singers will remain for two days longer, and these two days will be filled with jubilation. A splendid program of events will be carried out, starting with the parade at 10 o'clock this morning.

Splendid Flag Spectacle.

The saengerfest parade this morning promises to be an interesting and spirited spectacle. It will be a procession of flags borne by a legion of singers and members of various German organizations.

The mass chorus of 2,000 will be in line and city and county officials will appear with the hosts. Features of the parade will be flag companies, the Stars and Stripes being in the forefront.

The parade will start at 10 a. m. and the route will be as follows: Form at Seventeenth and Cam, east to Sixteenth, south to Farnam, east to Sixteenth, south to Leavenworth, counter march to Sixteenth and Farnam, east to Fourteenth, north to Farnam, west to Fifteenth, north to Douglas, east to Thirteenth, south to Howard and disband. Here a fleet of street cars will convey the marchers to the German home.

Celebrations will be held Saturday and Sunday at the German home. A big German picnic will be held and all are invited. There will be vocal and instrumental music aplenty. Special street cars will be provided for the German home service.

Railroads to East Still Are Paying the Elevation Charges

Although the railroads running south from Omaha have stopped paying elevation charges for the grain they carry from Omaha, the lines to the east have not changed their former policy. According to C. J. Chisam, general freight agent of the Great Western, the grain business of Omaha has not yet been affected by the change, but he believes that if the lines going east adopt the same tactics as the southern lines have, Omaha will feel the effect on its grain market.

If the lines going east stop paying elevation charges, said Mr. Chisam, "there will be no inducement for shippers to send their grain to Omaha. It will pass directly through here in order to save the elevation charge, and Omaha will fall to secure a large amount of grain that under the old ruling would stop here. It is of considerable importance to Omaha as a grain market to have the elevation charges paid by the railroads, as has been done for a number of years."

Les Tucker Nipped for Knowledge of White Slave Case

While he was lying in wait under the Eleventh street viaduct to catch a train out of town, Les Tucker, giving his address as the State hotel, was arrested by Detective Williams and Holden, charged with knowledge of the alleged white slavery of Margaret Lewis of Manhattan, Kan. and Edith Schone, 105 Mason street, Mrs. G. F. Rockefeller, 1618 Webster street, was arrested Thursday on the same charge and held for the government authorities, while the two girls were taken from her place and booked at police headquarters as inmates.

The Lewis girl testified to Chief of Detectives Maloney that she had come to Omaha in answer to a note purporting to be from the Schone girl, declaring that she was ill. The note proved to be a fraud, declares the Lewis girl, as her friend was well and happy. The police are investigating this feature of the case.

Bad Odor from Dead Animals is Coming Across State Line

In connection with the Ohio street and other dumping places, City Attorney Rine has struck an interesting lead in his legal research work.

An investigation showed that the smell of dead animals lying on Iowa territory, south of Carter lake, was blown onto Nebraska atmosphere by an interstate wind. Is this a case for the federal courts? Should not Washington take cognizance of a situation of this nature? Mr. Rine wants to know.

Should not Iowa be required to prevent such an odor being blown across the state line?
