Apart from the development of further labor controversies the general situation maintains its favorable ascepts. Recent settlement of the troubles in the building trades in the west had been followed by the adjustment of the local clothing strike, but fresh disturbances have arisen here and elsewhere, notably at oil planta in New Jersey.
