

### PARK POOLS CLOSED TO ALL SWIMMERS

Bathers to Be Permitted Only at the Two Places Where Swimming is Supervised.

#### CARTER AND SPRING LAKES

Commissioner Hummel has closed all bodies of water in the public parks except the municipal beach at Carter lake and the swimming pool at Spring Lake park, South Side, both of which are supervised.

This drastic action is the result of the verdict of a coroner's jury, holding the city park department negligent in the case of the drowning of a boy at Elmwood park a few days ago.

Signs are being made for posting at these ponds and lakes and hereafter persons wading or otherwise entering these waters will be regarded as trespassers.

This order refers to ponds or pools in Hancock, Kountze, Miller, Riverview and Elmwood parks. Children have been allowed to wade and in some instances to swim in these ponds, particularly so in Miller and Kountze parks.

#### Hummel Explains.

Commissioner Hummel explains his position in this manner: "In the case of the drowning at Elmwood park, it may be said that the pool there is used as a supply for the pavilion and not intended to be used otherwise. There is a watchman at this park, but it is difficult for one man to keep his eye on 20 acres of ground. It might just as well be said that every tree should be watched lest a boy climb to the branches, fall off and break his neck."

"It would be nice to have supervisors for each of the ponds. We have two life guards now at the municipal beach and ample protection at the swimming pool at Spring Lake park. We are planning a public bathing place for Riverview park and that, too, will be supervised when opened next spring."

Playing on a Raft. The boy who was drowned at Elmwood was a member of a Sunday school picnic. He was playing on a raft at the time he fell into the water.

Superintendent English of public recreation conferred with Commissioner Hummel on this closing order and he acquiesced in the action taken. Mr. English contends that if a coroner's jury will hold the park department negligent in such cases as the one in question, then the thing to do is to close these bodies of water until such a time as proper protection can be provided.

There are about five miles of shore line along Carter lake, on park property owned by the city. Mr. Hummel says he would like to ask a coroner's jury how many watchmen would be necessary to guard this extensive shore line to insure that no person enter the water and, perchance, drown.

Woman Puts Out Fire While Husband is 'Phoning for Help'

When a gasoline stove exploded at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Nels Simpson, 213 North Nineteenth avenue, Mrs. Simpson calmly proceeded to extinguish the blaze by applying wet clothes and buckets of water.

Mr. Simpson was slightly burned on his hands. He removed his burning clothes and telephoned for the fire department, but in the meantime his wife had subdued the flames.

Mrs. Simpson says there is no use getting excited over a little matter like a gasoline stove explosion and fire.

J. F. Fitzgerald, former tax assessor in South Omaha, will take Mr. Merrell's place in the South Side city hall.

Collins was taken to the Nicholas Stern hospital, where his injuries were dressed.
