LUCKY DEMOS SEEM

As Yet None of Four Gentlemen
Who Had Plum Baskets Filled
Look Over New Quarters.

FLYNN GOES TO THE COUNTRY

None of the four gentlemen, who have had their plum baskets filled by the recent appointments to federal positions in Omaha, has called to look his new quarters over.

"Can't" these took time by the forelock and called on Tom Flynn from the marshal's office and invited him to come over and give them a line on just when he is planning to take charge. But "Tom" said there was no hurry about it. He was going out in the country with his boys for several days and when he came back he might take time to drop in. Flynn didn't seem to care a pin about the job.

The employees of the various offices have been busy answering the "whens" and "ifs" of their friends as to whether they will be out of a job now.

In the office of the custodian and collector of customs, all the employees are under the civil service and their jobs are nailed down and clinched. This includes three deputies at this office, two in Lincoln and about thirty-five laborers.

Deputy Collector North isn't sure just how many of the people in that busy office are immune from replacement.

Most of them are under the civil service. And several of the deputy collectors, those appointed for collection of income taxes at any rate are of the democratic persuasion in politics.

In the United States marshal's office there is much uncertainty. President Roosevelt by his decree of March 2, 1909, placed these positions as well as that of deputy internal revenue collector under the civil service. But congress later changed them back to the old order.

However, there is a gleam of hope. President Wilson in connection with his approval of the act gave out the following statement:

"I am convinced, after a careful examination of the facts, that the office of deputy collector and deputy marshal were never intended to be included under the ordinary provisions of the civil service law. The control of the whole method and spirit of the administration of the proviso in this bill which concerns the appointment of these officers is no less entirely in my hands now than it was before the bill became law; my warm advocacy and support both of the principle and of the bona fide practice of civil service reform is known to the whole country, and there is no danger that the spoils principle will creep in with my approval or connivance."

Must Give Reasons.
"Deputies whose chief duties are not to serve process (office deputies) have, since March 2, 1909, been appointed under the rules of the civil service. Hereafter whenever a change in respect of any such place is contemplated by a marshal he must report the facts, especially as to the qualifications of the proposed appointee, to this department and secure its express approval before making any permanent appointment thereto."
