#### MANY REMEMBER THE DAY

Speak not harshly on this day of the showers and cool weather which are visiting Omaha. This is the anniversary of the hot wind of July 26,

On that fearful day twenty-one years ago "showers and cooler" would have been greeted with thankagivings and tears by residents of the middle west and would have been worth about a million of dollars to them.

Today low temperatures and showers were general over a greater part of the territory swept in 1894 by the hot wind.

Twenty-one years ago the mercury stood at 90 degrees early in the morning and rose steadily until at 2:20 o'clock it reached 10% at the government observaery. A scorching wind blew mercileasly for a period of six hours, burning crops until they were worthless even as fodder for animals. The wind was a record breaker, its like

ver having been seen before or since. It brought mortgages and poverty to the farmers, and in turn to village and city folks. It blew from Texas north to the British line, and from the Rocky mountains over into Iowa Missouri and

Because corn was destroyed, farmers were compelled to sacrifice hogs and catile, for which market prices tumbled slarmingly. Farmers became consumers instead of producers of grain and land values felt.
