REDFIELD BEGINS HIS INVESTIGATION

United States Attorney Says Number of Other Boats May Be Taken Off the Lake.

FEDERAL CLAIM OF AUTHORITY

CHICAGO, July 29 .- Examination of witnesses in the inquiry of the United States Department of Commerce, under the personal supervision of Secretary Redfield, into the cause of the Eastland disaster, began here today.

Witnesses, including the officers and crew of the steamer and a long list of survivors, were summoned to the federal building to tell their versions of the catastrophe.

While this inquiry was progressing. United States District Attorney Clyne prepared to empanel a grand jury to investigate the question of criminal responsibility for the accident. In the state's attorney's ofefforts were directed to determine the extent of the jurisdiction of the state grand jury over the persons held by the coroner's jury for grand jury action. Doubt was bxpressed over the jurisdiction of the state over federal officials.

Boats May Be Taken Off Lake, District Attorney Ciyne visited the Eastland and inspected the hulk for the first time. He hinted that a number of well known excursion steamers "might have to come off the lake."

Speaking of possible action by the state grand jury District Attorney Clyne

"If any action against those responsible is ordered by the state grand jury we will demand the right to enter proceedings against the two steamboat inspectors and the boat captain named by the coroner's jury, in advance of any action which may be taken by the state's attorney following indictments by the grand jury. These men are government officers, the captain holding a governthe fullest co-operation from the govern-

Council Abandons Its Inquiry. The independent investigation ordered U.S. Marines Guard by the city council was virtually abandoned today on the advice of the corporation counsel, who held the opinion that the jurisdiction of the city did not extend over the docks.

The council's investigating co decided, however, to petition President Wilson to appoint an investigating com-mission to act independently of federal authorities and to have the government make a stability test of every excursion ressel running out of Chicago. The council committee appointed a sub-com-mittee which, in connection with the city engineering bureau and the city harbor master, will make a thorough inspection of every excursion heat in and about Chicago.

As a result of worry over the Becker case, the governor is said to be nearly exhausted. He has followed every move as closely as any of the attorneys and his appearance shows plainly the effects of hours of study and worry

Sole Hope Lies in Governor. NEW YORK, July 29.-The sole hope of saving Charles Becker from dying in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison tomorrow morning lies in Governor Whitman. Counsel for the condemned man announced today that they had abandoned the idea of appealing to Judge Hogan of the court of appeals at Syracuse for a stay of execution

The attorneys added that the only course remaining open for them to pursue was to appeal to the governor to reprieve Becker until October, when the court of appeals reconvenes. Should the governor grant such a stay of execution. counsel said they would enter an appeal from the decision of Supreme Court Justice Ford, who last aight declined to grant a new trial on the ground of newly discovered evidence.

Decision of Justice Ford. Justice Ford announced his decision at 10 o'clock last night in his chamber where he had labored for several days and nights on the briefs submitted for and against the application for a new trial. He called the waiting newspaper men into his chambers and, as his secretary handed them copies of his typewritten decision the justice said:

"I have denied the motion for a new trial, and this is my birthday. I'm 53 today. It's a pretty tough way to spend your birthday, iwn't it?" I virtually arrived at my decision Tues-

BERLIN (Via London), July 29.-German army headquarters today gave out a statement on the progress of hostilities as follows: "In Flanders our artiflery destroyed a

"Near Givenchy, in the Argonne, and near Vaquois we successfully blew up mines. French mine explosions in the hampague district were without result. To the northeast of Suwalki, along both sides of the railroad to Olita, our troops have occupied a portion of the enemy position, capturing 2,816 prisoners and two machine guns.
