"At least twelve of the moving picture theaters of this city frequently are crowded in aisles and entrances. We are going to have a catastrophe some of these days," declared Chairman Butler of the city council committee of the whole, during a discussion in connection with two proposed

ing picture operators. This discussion was incidental to the main question.

"I agree with the chair on this question. These moving picture men will sell all the tickets they can just to get the money. I have been around these places and I know what I am talking about, The conditions are rotten," was a statement by Commissioner Hummel.

Needs More Policemen. It was agreed that it is up to the police department to regulate these alleged crowded conditions, Commissioner Kugel said he would have to put on fifty more policemen to control the situation. The commissioner recommended

passage an ordinance introduced Commissioner Withnell creating a board of examiners, to consist of the city electrician, chief building inspector and fire warden for examination of picture machine operators. The measure provides that permits shall not be issued to operators less than 21 years of age nor to applicants who have not had at least one year's experience as apprentice under a petent operator.

Mr. Butler's ordinance, which was placed on file, provided that the examining board should comprise two exhibitors, two operators and the city elec-

### KUGEL FINDS MOST BONDS WORTHLESS

Has City Abstracter Look Up Standing-But Six of Thirty-Two Are Good.

BRITT PROMISES A CHANGE

Commissioner Kugel has made an investigation which, he claims, shows a lax system in police court regarding the approval of appeal bonds.

The commissioner prepared a lift of thirty-two recent appeal bonds and reposted City Abstracter Hartley to inrestigate the sufficiency of each bond. Mr. Hartley reports that in only six cases were the bondsmen legally liable for the amounts of the bonds. The law requires that in the case of a bond for 300, for instance, the bondsmen shall be responsible for the amount, over and above his legal exemptions.

In twenty-six out of the thirty-two cases in question the city abstracter reported the bonds were not worth the paper on which they were written.

Many Bonds Worthless.

"What I am getting after is the easy nanner in which some offenders escape through the operation of this farcical system of police court appeal bonds. A man told me his name appeared on at least fifteen of these bonds and he admitted he could not be held liable in any one of the bonds.
