Harry K. Thaw to STOP OFF IN OMAHA. Is Now Enroute Here from Chicago On His Motor Trip to the Pacific Coast. PRIVATE SECRETARY HERE NOW. H. J. Rice, private secretary for Harry K. Thaw, who on July 16 was declared to be sane by Supreme Court Justice Peter A. Hendrick in New York following a similar decision by a jury which sat on the case after Thaw had spent approximately seven years at Matteawan and had made numerous attempts to secure his freedom, arrived in Omaha this morning from De Kalb, Ill., where he left the Thaw party, which is traveling overland by motor to the Pacific coast.

Mr. Rice will remain in Omaha, stopping at the Fontenelle hotel until the Thaw party arrives here. Then he will proceed by train westward to Denver, again to await Mr. Thaw's arrival in that city. He is acting as a kind of advance agent for the Thaw party.

Mr. Rice expects Thaw to arrive in Omaha some time Monday or Tuesday, probably Monday evening, unless accidents of some kind should be encountered en route or unless the Iowa mud-proves to be slow going as a result of the many rains. Rice left Thaw at DeKalb at 8:30 Friday evening. Thaw will probably remain here a day.

That Thaw and his party are merely taking a pleasure trip to the coast, motor-ing the entire distance is the word of his secretary. Omaha happens to be one of the points on the itinerary. Thaw left New York the same day he received his freedom, July 16, on a \$25,000 bond named by Justice Hendrick, when the state appealed the case. Thaw still under this bond, as the state has withdrawn its appeal, although it is possible that this may be done, the attorney general having the case under advisement.

Shooting Nine Years Ago. It was nine years ago June 2 that Thaw shot Stanford White on the roof garden at Madison Square, New York. He was tried for murder, but released on the charge, the jury judging him insane. He began a series of attempts at freedom that gave Thaw almost as much space in the public prints as the European war. His was unsuccessful in every attempt until the last, when Justice Hendrick made his July decision, seeing, as he did so, the alienists who declared Thaw insane.

Charles S. Wharton of Chicago, a nephew of the Omaha postmaster and ex-congressman, is with the Thaw party. "Whatever people may think of Thaw," said Postmaster Wharton, "his mother is a fine woman and she has done and is doing a great deal for the Presbyterian Theological seminary here.

When we were raising funds for the new location and building I wrote to Mrs. Thaw and asked her to contribute \$5,000. She replied that I should let her know when the cornerstone was laid and she would give that sum. So I sent her copies of the newspapers and a letter when the stone was laid. She replied by sending me her check for \$5,000.

"Since then she has contributed right along to the seminary's endowment fund and current expenses. I believe that altogether Mrs. Thaw has given nearly \$50,000 to the seminary."

Vincent Astor Gives Cup for Auto Race. NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—When the Sheepshead Bay speedway opens on October 1, the 30 mile inaugural race will be for a perpetual automobile trophy which was offered today by Vincent Astor, the event to be known as the Vincent Astor cup race. In addition to the trophy, the speedway management offers \$50,000 in cash prizes for this event. One of the conditions of the Astor cup race is that no car will be eligible to compete unless it is capable of making an average speed of eighty-five miles an hour.

Traffic Tied Up at Lane Cut-Off
