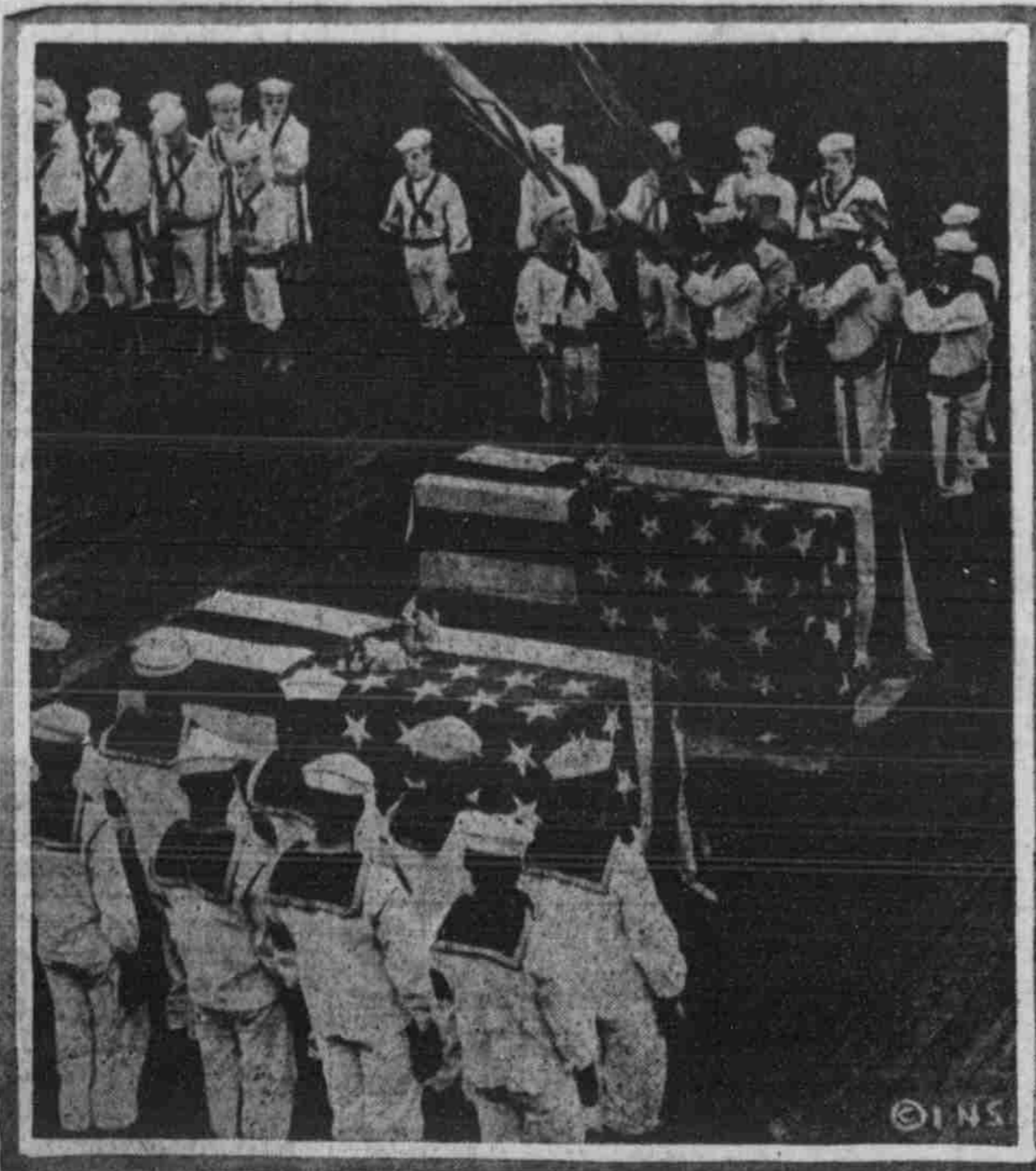

DARK HALLWAYS MUST BE LIGHTED

Commissioners to Enforce Some of the Provisions of the City Building Laws.

CITY DAD HAS A BAD NIGHT

Inasmuch as this is an enlightened nation, the city building department intends to enforce a provision of the building laws requiring lights during the night hours in hallways of buildings used as public dwellings. The new building ordinances have been compiled and in printed form make a book of 205 pages. The building department will take page at a time in enforcement of some of dead-letter features. The idea of requiring these nocturnal beacon lights in hallways was suggested by one of the city commissioners who last week had occasion to visit a sick friend who resides on the second floor of an apartment building. The commissioner could not find a light in the front hallway. He discerned the outline of what proved to be a step. He placed his right foot forward and elevated it at an angle he believed would reach the first step, but when he brought his foot down he touched the floor of the hall and nearly fell forward on his face. Wherefore, he was exceedingly wroth. He dropped his fountain pen, tooth brush, match box and several loose remarks on the floor. While he was picking up the various articles he dropped \$10 in small change, and then his hat fell off gathering up the money.

Wheat Continues to Drop in Price

The condition of the wheat market upset all calculations of the dealers again, and none of them could figure out the cause for the break that continued from Friday. Again wheat sold off, that of the new crop losing 30¢ and that of the old, 10¢. New wheat sold anywhere from \$1.91 to \$1.15, depending largely upon the grade and condition. The old wheat held around \$1.80. There were continued reports of more cancellations or orders for shipment during September, and still other reports that the warring countries of Europe had ordered cancellation of several large shipments of cavalry and artillery horses. Wheat receipts for the day were sixty carloads.

Corn continued reasonably firm, losing only 1/2¢, the price remaining around 76¢ per bushel. Receipts were twenty-two carloads. Oats went off 10¢, prices being 48¢ to 50¢ per bushel. The receipts were but nine carloads.

Condition of Roberts Reported Critical

W. E. Roberts, 87 Marcy street, assaulted August 10 by R. T. Gibson, a farm hand, at Thirteenth and Howard streets, was picked up on South Twelfth street Friday night, where he had fallen as the result of a hemorrhage from a ruptured blood vessel in the head. He was taken to St. Joseph hospital, where his condition is said to be serious. Gibson, who was arrested by Detective Shoop following the assault, is now serving time in the county jail as a result of a \$25 and costs fine imposed on him for his attack on Roberts. Gibson was intoxicated at the time, and, according to Roberts, assaulted him without provocation.

OMAHA STRUCTURAL STEEL WORKS GETS BIG CONTRACT

The largest order for structural steel ever secured by an Omaha concern has just been placed with the Omaha Structural Steel works for the steel for the new fourteen-story First National Bank building at Sixteenth and Farnam streets. The First National people have set it down as a policy that home people shall be patronized as much as possible, in the buying of material necessary to build this structure, and have taken the first step in that direction by placing this order.

The order calls for about 2,400 tons of structural steel, a quantity approximating \$100,000 in value.

TWO ARE REVIVED BY THE USE OF PULMOTOR

Mrs. Louise Logan, 190 California street, phoned headquarters Saturday morning that two of her boarders had been overcome with gas. The men, Tom and Dan Carr, brothers, upon getting Friday night, in some manner turned on the gas jet after they had turned off the light. They were attended by Drs. Charles Zimmerman and Charles Shoop, who revived them with the use of the pulmotor.

LIFE GUARD REFUSES TO LET HIS SUPERIOR LAND

Deputy Sheriff Foster, who happens to be a member of the Recreation board, was given a striking object lesson Friday evening at Carter lake, when his motor boat was stopped at the municipal beach by a life-guard, who declined to allow his superior to land at the beach.

One of the orders given the life guards is to prohibit the landing of motor boats at this beach. When Mr. Foster, with Sheriff McShane, hove in sight, intending to tie up at the beach, the guard politely and firmly informed Mr. Foster of the rule.

Mr. Foster and the sheriff smiled and obeyed the injunction. "That's the kind of an employe I like," remarked Mr. Foster.

NAME PLANNING BOARD SOON

Mayor Dahlgren Says that There Will Be No Councilmen on the List.

0 FUNDS FOR PRESENT YEAR

Mayor Dahlgren states that members of the city council will not be named on the new city planning board which will be appointed within the next few weeks. "The members of this board should be citizens who are willing to work without pay and who are public-spirited and willing to devote time and effort to the work," said the mayor.

The law enacted by the last legislature states the members of this board shall serve without pay and that there shall be five members.

The law gives the board authority to acquire lands by purchase, gift or condemnation for administrative, educational or institutional purposes. Working under the direction of the mayor and council, the board will have general supervision of the future growth of the city and will have power to restrict various features which do not accord with civic beauty or utility.

The location of parks, parkways, boulevards and playgrounds will be embraced in the work.

Two Dogs Which Bit Women Are Killed

This board will in no way conflict with the welfare board, which will be announced before long.

The planning board will have no funds to work with this year, but it is proposed to make an appropriation when the 1916 apportionment of funds is worked out.
