The people of Omaha have answered emphatically in the affirmative the question whether they want to see high-class trotting and pacing races, and only two main issues remain to be settled: On how large a scale shall next year's race meeting be held and where shall it be located. Already the horsemen have decided to hold in the near future a consultation to which all local men who desire to boost the game in Omaha will be invited, for the purpose of answering these queries.

As this gathering will include the directors of the Omaha Driving club and a number, of other big business men of the city who are accustomed to succeed in whatever they undertake, the prospects are that their decision will mean something of permanent, substantial good for Omaha.

Organise Stock Company. Ed Patterson, president of the Omaha Driving club, and Otis M. Smith, secretary, have received congratulations from hundreds of Omahans on the success of the recent race meeting and on the sportsman-like manner in which it was conducted, and it is apparent that successful promotion of a stock company for the purpose of constructing a suitable training and racing plant would be rather an easy matter. This, it is probable, will be the basis of the plan to be considered
