

FOUR AMERICANS AMONG MISSING; BERLIN NERVOUS

Twenty-Five Passengers Aboard Torpedoed Liner Arabic Are Still Unaccounted For.

STATEMENT OF STAR LINE

German Foreign Office Alarmed Action Will Lead to Trouble with U. S.

PRESS COMMENT IS FORBIDDEN

BULLETIN. WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Eight names now appear on the State department's list of American passengers not found among survivors of the lost liner Arabic.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The Exchange Telegraph company today received the following dispatch dated Berlin via Amsterdam:

"News of the sinking of the Arabic caused great nervousness, the foreign office fearing it would lead to serious difficulties with Washington."

"Details are withheld from the newspapers, which are prohibited from making comment."

Revised List Given.

NE WYOMING, Aug. 20.—A revised list of the surviving passengers and those unaccounted for corrected according to the only despatch received by the White Star line today, was given out tonight.

Tonight, however, a despatch was received by the state department from the American consul at Liverpool in which Houlihan and Elmore, together with Mrs. Brugiere and Mr. Wood were named as four Americans missing.

FRANK FUNERAL HELD IN BROOKLYN

Body is Interred in Mount Carmel Cemetery Early in Morning After Brief Service.

WIDOW COLLAPSES AT GRAVE

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—The body of Leo M. Frank, who was lynched at Marietta, Ga., was buried today in Mount Carmel cemetery, Brooklyn.

Frank's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Frank; the widow, and Frank's sister, Mrs. Otto Stern, and her husband, occupied the automobile that followed the hearse.

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About forty curious persons were in the cemetery when Frank's body arrived and they crowded close to the grave during the services. Perfect order was maintained.

Oak Tree Carefully Guarded. Today were guarding the big oak tree, two miles from here on which the lifeless body of Leo M. Frank, convicted of the murder of Mary Phagan, was found dangling last Tuesday morning.

Meanwhile, the tree is being guarded night and day. It was said that Mr. Frey had declined an offer of \$200 for the tree and in doing so planned to build a wall about the tragically historic oak.

War Shares Drop Several Points at Market Opening
